#### Fielder Lost Game For His Team by Catching Foul Fly

There are times when it is better to drop a ball than it is to hold it. Several years ago an outfielder in the National League lost a very important game by making a remarkably long running catch of a long foul fly near the fence. If he had dropped the ball his team might have had a chance to win.

That sounds queer, doesn't it? It is sound common baseball sense, however, and here is the answer:

A runner was on third, with only one out, and one run was eded to win. By catching the long foul the fielder allowed the runner to wait on the bag until the ball was caught and then score, as you see done every day. If the fielder had allowed the foul fly to drop out of his hands or had not gone for it, there would have been no trouble, as the runner could not advance on a foul which was not caught. The very fact that he had to run a long way for the ball made it impossible to recover and throw to the plate in

It takes a ballplayer with quick judgment not to go after one of these fouls, as it is his natural impulse to try and catch the quickly taken apart for packing.
