LOCAL JUNIORS ARE O.A.B.A. CHAMPIONS

"Y" Juniors Win Basketball Final From Kingston Kids by 72 to 22.

TORONTO, April 21.—To A. T. Taylor, physical director of the "Y," and his hardworking collection of basketball stars, the "Y" Juniors, belongs the honor of bringing the first O.A.B.A. championship to London. The Forest City kids came down here Saturday afternoon and proceeded to wipe, beat up and otherwise wallop the Kingston youngsters 72-22 in a sudden-death game for the championship. It was sudden death for the stone-breakers, for they were confident that they had it over the Londoners several million ways.

The half-time score read, London 41, Kingston 7. The Londoners were working like smoothly-oiled machines. Their combination was superb and their shooting deadly from all angles and positions. They completely outplayed the heavier and larger Kingston gang all the way through.

Mascara did the heavy artillery work for the winners. He garnered 23 points, enough to beat the losers by five, and got them all in the first half. Gilles piled up 14, while Lightfoot and McCreach grabbed an even dozen. Funk McLean, a graduate of the London high school league, took Mascara's place in the second half and played a strong game. WALTER JOHNSTON IS IMPROVING WITH AGE

Griffith's Star Going Great Guns at the Present Time.

PHILADELPHIA, April 21.—Mackmen easily can account for not hitting Walter Johnson, as opinion appears unanimous that Walter is the best pitcher today than he was five years ago. Only Ames Strunk and Stuffy McInnis, of the A's, can attest to this. All the youths had to say when this topic was discussed was to the effect that if it were not for him, they are perfectly satisfied they did not break into the American League at that time.

A brave scribe told the Mackmen that he heard Johnson had been practicing on a spit, this spring, and would foist it on the batsmen in the near future. This statement, however, was a volley of comment followed, Stuffy McInnis asked for the floor and this is what he said about the old-time pitcher.

"I'll be murder in the first degree when Walter starts shooting that spitter at you. He is not the most pleasant guy in the world to meet at present, and so far as we are concerned, we won't register a single kick if he doesn't improve."

"Take it from me, it takes a lot of fast one of his, and it will take more when he uses the spitter and the ball shoots in all directions. As it is, we are happy when we get a few fouls off Walter, who is better than ever this year, and needs no spitter to help him out."

McInnis is not alone in declaring the speed king better than ever this year. Clarke Griffith, Johnson's manager, brought out this same point during a recent interview. Johnson never fanning bee yesterday. Johnson never has looked so good at this time of the season, and I venture the prediction that he has the greatest year of his sensational career, barring possibly, 1912," said Manager Griffith.

"I know Johnson is better because he never reached first-class condition in the spring before without weakening himself. For three years he has lost a lot of his stuff by working too hard in the training camp."

"This spring I tried a new method of conditioning Johnson, and must say that it has worked out great. In other words, Walter was the hardest worker in camp, but this spring I would not let him throw a ball for two weeks, excepting in fielding bunts and returning fly balls. He just loafed about the fields, but took off the excess weight without taxing his strength."

"The result is that he returned home stronger than at any time in his career, and will put on weight and get still stronger as the season progresses. Johnson has not been able to get his speed until June or July in recent years, but I want to say that he was faster yesterday than he has been at any time in the last five years, and I think McInnis and Strunk will bear me out."

"Johnson has something now that he never had when he was a kid—a curve ball. And believe me, he has a beauty this spring. Remember my prediction that Walter will have a wonderful year. With Johnson going at his best, we are likely to fool a few of the critics. The score was 6-4 when Umpire Feeney called the last man out in the ninth."
