Pte. Young Writes of Naval Attack On Belgian Coast.

JULY 1 AND 4 OBSERVED

Great Days of Dominion and U. S. A. Cause Hearty Celebration in England.

Pte. Fred Young, whose letters have come to be a treat to which readers eagerly look forward, has left Hastings and St. Leonards, where he was in a hospital, and is now sufficiently recovered to be sent to a training camp in Sussex, from which place another of his peppy letters reached The Advertiser today. In his latest letter he tells of the celebration of July 1st and July 4th, by the Canadian and British troops, and adds some interesting remarks on camp routine.

Dear friend—There is an axiom that warns us that today's job is tomorrow's. By failing to live up to this letter has missed the regular mail, but because we put it off for a few hours.

When the "morning" came it gave us unexpected orders to pack all our belongings in our old kit bags and to be ready to move at a moment's notice. The trail for the above address. We have changed the crowded promenade of Hastings and St. Leonards for the rural scenery of the training camp under canvas, but our heart still thrills with the pleasant memories of the times spent in dear old Hastings. The last day we spent there was Dominion Day, and we saw 8,000 Canadian soldiers march through the street to a park where they were to be stationed. The march was accompanied by the band, and the soldiers were in high spirits.

Monday, July 2nd, was proclaimed a holiday in Hastings, and the boys were allowed to enjoy themselves, each man to his own taste. We are to be sent to a new area, and we only saw two boys in all our tour who did not meet with our approval.

No doubt the cables told you of the gathering in Old London, where King George and some of the ex-governors of Canada joined together in praising Canada's noble efforts in the war. The people of Britain have learned much about the Canadians during these years of war that they have learned from the long generations before. When we visited this little island nine or ten years ago, the people spoke of the Canadians as being "stupid" and "ignorant." Now they speak of them as being "brave" and "valiant."

July, the 4th—the glorious Fourth was celebrated by great demonstrations in favour of America, and Old glory was proudly conspicuous everywhere, a splendid change from the irritating days of last March.

We are still in Sussex by the seaside, on three sides of the camp a ring of woodland forms a beautiful picture. The trees we catch glimpses of waving from nodding in the bright July sun.

For the past three days and nights we have plainly heard the heavy cannonading on the Belgian coast. It sounds like thousands of big drums in the distance. There is a rumor that the United States and Canada are sending a fleet of battleships to the coast. It is a rumor, but it is a rumor that is worth listening to.

On our way down here we came across a bunch of German prisoners at a railway station. They looked very tired, but we could see that they were not "non grata" with everyone. It looks like they are being treated as if they were human beings.

Sidney Runnelt, whose parents live at Glen Allen, Wellington County, enlisted with the 11th Battalion in January, 1916, and deserted in August, 1916. He gave as his excuse that he wanted to go to the front, and that he was not allowed to do so.
