

MINERS' STRIKE IN ENGLAND IS SETTLED

CROATIAN TROOPS REVOLT AND LEAVE THEIR UNITS

RETURNED SOLDIERS HELPED DEFEAT CONSERVATIVE GOVT. IN PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

General Dissatisfaction With the Administration of Public Affairs by Arsenault's Government Brought About the Defeat of Conservatives, Who Retained Only Four Out of Thirty Seats.

Toronto, July 25.—In connection with the Prince Edward Island provincial elections, when the Liberals, under the leadership of J. H. Bell, defeated Premier Arsenault's Conservative Government, taking 26 seats out of 30, the Globe's special correspondent says: "Returned soldiers did not take an active part in the contest, but it is evident that the large majority of them voted Liberal. Fine weather brought out a very large vote. There was a big turnover in Charlottetown. Liberals capturing both seats by a large majority. The labor men going with the Opposition. Dissatisfaction with the administration of the public works department, especially neglect of roads with the administration of the agricultural department, and with the proposal of the Government to levy additional taxation, told against the Conservatives. People also looked with disfavor upon the highway bill, fearing that the payment of the 40 per cent asked for by the Federal Government would be too heavy a burden."

LIBERALS WIN 26 OUT OF 30 SEATS IN P. E. I.

Arsenault's Conservative Government Goes Down To Defeat.

LEADERS ARE ELECTED
But Two Ministers Besides
Premier Survive Political
Landslide.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., July 25.—Complete returns of yesterday's election show 26 Liberals and 4 Conservatives returned. Both leaders, Premier Arsenault and J. H. Bell, were elected. In addition to the premier only two members of the executive were elected. The Liberal majority was 26 to 4. The Conservatives elected were: Bell, Lee, Gallant, McNeill, Saunders, Dennis, McLean, McArthur, Ross, Hughes, Lepage, Brodie, D. McDonald, Nash, Irving, Higgs, Dury, D. McDonald, Acorn, Cos. CONFESSED FORGER ALLOWED TO GO ON SUSPENDED SENTENCE

Returned Soldier Suffering From War
Wounds Is Granted Leniency.

Winnipeg, July 25.—Lieut. C. E. Dobbs, confessed forger, was released on suspended sentence and \$2,000 bond by Mr. Justice Macdonald at the law courts yesterday. It was announced that the attorney-general's department consented to the suspension of sentence owing to the mental condition of Dobbs, who was suffering from severe war wounds when the crime was committed.

THIRTY KILLED DURING REVOLT OF CROATANS

Movement Started by Garri-
son To Separate From
Serbia.

TROOPS LEAVE UNITS

Army of Croatia Is in State of
Dissolution Owing To
Outbreaks.

Paris, July 25.—Dispatches from Agram and Graz report a serious military revolt in Croatia. The revolt is taking the form of a movement for separation from Serbia, and the formation of a republic. Violent combats occurred on Tuesday evening at Marburg, 26 miles southeast of Graz, where a large part of the garrison revolted as a result of dissatisfaction over demobilization. Thirty persons were killed and many wounded.

Troops are leaving their units, officers and subalterns are tearing off their insignia, and the army is in a state of dissolution, the advices say. The railroads and telegraphs are tied up. The Serbians are trying to suppress the revolution by the use of troops, both Serbian and Croatian. The Croatian troops have proclaimed an independent Croatian republic, according to a dispatch from Agram, the capital. At several points the Croats are fraternizing with Hungarian soldiers.

MARINE WORKERS STRIKE SETTLED

Compromise Reached Between
Steamship Owners and New
York Strikers.

New York, July 25.—Announcement of the settlement of the marine workers' strike was expected to be made today. Raymond B. Stevens, vice-chairman of the United States Shipping Board, who came here Monday, has since had conferences with representatives of both the seamen and the operators, and intimated that practically the only things necessary to complete a compromise are the signatures. The terms of compromise could not be learned, but as both the steamship men and the strikers have said they would accept the preferential for American seamen first and union men second, it is assumed that some sort of satisfactory working arrangement has been made, and that neither the strikers nor steamship owners are put in the position of abandoning their fight.

COBALT MINERS TO CALL OUT ALL MEN IF IT IS POSSIBLE

Only New Development in the
Strike Situation Is Leave
Mines Without Men.

Cobalt, Ont., July 24.—The only announced development in the local labor situation since noon today was the decision of the members of the Miners' Union, reached at a closed meeting in the Grand Theatre, to call out, if possible, every man in every mine in the camp. Until this afternoon certain employees of the companies, captains, shift bosses and some others, were at work at the plants, but the union will make appeal to them to leave their jobs and leave the mines without men entirely.

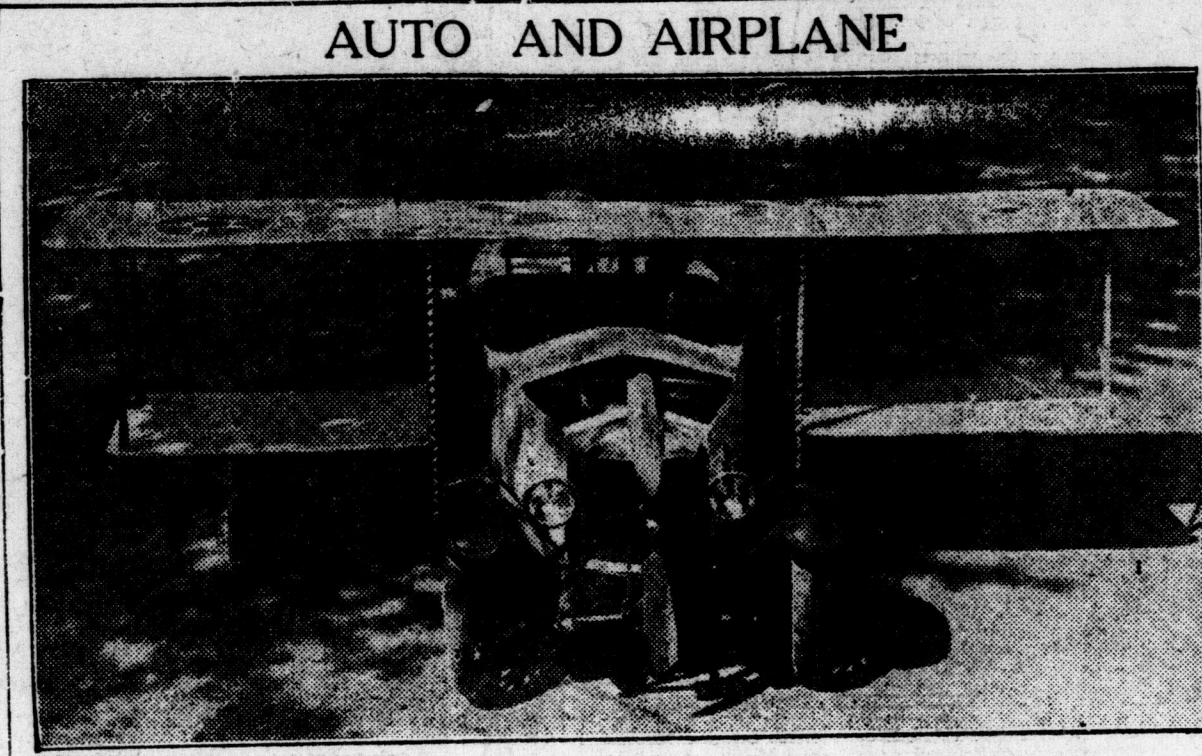

QUEBEC WILL BE WILLING TO FOLLOW LIBERAL LEADER FROM ANOTHER PROVINCE

Joseph Archambault At Montreal Meeting Declares New
Chief Must Be Selected Outside of Quebec — French
Satisfied Because They Had Laurier Since 1887.

Montreal, July 25.—A hint of what will be the attitude of the Quebec delegates at the Liberal convention to be held in August next was given by Mr. Jos. Archambault, M.P. for Chambly Verchères, at a meeting held last night.

Mr. Archambault said that the new leader would have to be selected outside of Quebec, not because Quebec is lacking in men qualified enough, but because a Quebecer in the present circumstances would not secure a strong enough following in the other provinces while the French Liberals, who had had one of their own as a leader since 1887, would have no objection to following a chief from any other province. All that was intended was to get a man strong enough to oust the Unionist party.

JOINT CHAIRMANSHIP LIKELY FOR BIG LIBERAL CONVENTION

Ottawa, July 25.—It becomes more and more the view of prominent Liberals in Ottawa and elsewhere that a joint chairmanship of the national Liberal convention will best meet the wishes of all concerned. The names mentioned most frequently are Premier Murray of Nova Scotia, who has held office since 1896, and Premier Gouin, as a great representative of French-Canadian Liberalism. One view is that

Premier Gouin should be chairman, as it is the unwritten law of all concerned that it is the turn now for an English-speaking Protestant leader. When the new premier of Prince Edward Island comes to the convention he will receive an ovation. There are now eight Liberal premiers of provinces, and the Prince Edward Island event has caused a sudden increase in optimism with regard to the next Ontario election.

PEACE TERMS HAVING BUT SLIGHT EFFECT ON AUSTRIAN PUBLIC

Vienna Newspapers Protest
Against Severe Conditions
Laid Down by Allies.

Vienna, July 25.—The new terms of the Austrian peace treaty are making no special impression on the general public. The newspapers, however, remark that the world is still attempting to treat Austria as a great state instead of one which has lost five-sixths of her territory, and has been reduced from a great empire of 55,000,000 persons to 6,000,000, who are facing a winter in which hundreds of thousands are sure to die of famine or cold.

GERMAN NATIONAL ASSEMBLY DISCUSSES ECONOMIC POLICY

Biele, July 24.—A Weimar dispatch says that the German national assembly yesterday discussed an interpellation on the economic policy. Several of the speakers demanded the adoption of free trade with the view of curbing monopolies and improving German exchange.

13,000 OUNCES OF PLATINUM IS SOLD AT \$105 AN OUNCE

New York, July 25.—Thirteen thousand ounces of platinum have been sold by the ordnance department of the army. It was announced here today. The mineral was withdrawn from the assay office and sold at \$105 an ounce.

NEW POLITICAL PARTY IS FORMED IN CUBA

Platform of New Organization
Is To Prevent U. S. Inter-
ference.

Havana, July 24.—A new political party was formed in Cuba today, with "non-interference of other nations in Cuba's affairs" as its principal platform. The sponsors for the party are prominent men of the Liberal and Conservative parties, who have endeavored unsuccessfully to persuade their respective parties that they should not permit Americans to interfere in any way with Cuba's internal matters.

CANADIANS MAY PETITION GOVT. TO BAR DETROIT FREE PRESS ON ACCOUNT OF ANTI-BRITISH ITEMS

Articles Written Over the Signature of "Costello" Criticizes
British Command in Siberia—Great War Veterans Are
Incensed At Abusive Items and Demand That Paper Be
Prohibited From Entering Dominion.

Windsor, July 25.—Anti-British articles, written over the signature "Costello," appearing regularly in the Free Press, a Detroit morning paper, have so incensed the people along the Canadian border that a movement is on foot to petition the Federal authorities to have the paper banned from entering Canada.

CRITICIZES BRITISH COMMAND.
Costello claims to be a veteran of the A. E. F. that served in Siberia, and his articles teem with abuse of the British command which he alleges counseled leaving the wounded to their fate. Further he alleges that the command of the forces been in the hands of Americans there would have been a different story to tell.

VETERANS ARE ANGRY.
Great War Veterans along the border are angry, not so much with the disgruntled soldier as with a newspaper lending its columns to his rantings. Lieut. L. Leighton, recently home from Siberia, gives the lie direct to the allegations of cowardice. "Unless the Government prohibits a paper carrying such cowardly propaganda entering Canada, we border veterans have another method that we will not hesitate to use," was a threat an officer of the Windsor command made today. Another of the articles is promised in Sunday's edition of the paper. Costello is connected with the Roman Catholic University in Detroit.

RUMANIA AND SERBIA WILL GET GREATER PORTION OF INDEMNITY FROM BULGARIA

More Than Billion Francs Is Demanded by Allies — Greece
Will Be Awarded Balance of Amount Levied On
Bulgaria.

Paris, July 25.—Rumania and Serbia are awarded the greater part of more than a billion francs indemnity demanded under the Bulgarian peace terms, which are nearly finished, according to the Excelsior. The remainder of the amount will be given to Greece, the paper says.

Veterans Send King Message From Montreal

Number of Resolutions Are
Adopted at Annual Con-
vention On Land Settle-
ment, etc.

Montreal, July 24.—This Dominion convention of the Army and Navy Veterans' Association in Canada, representing campaigns from the Crimea to the great European war, assures your majesty of its loyalty to the British crown and its readiness to defend your majesty every perfect wish. We pray that your good Queen may long be spared to rule our land and empire.

The above is the text of a resolution adopted at the convention of the Army and Navy Veterans' Association today, which will be cabled to the King.

A number of resolutions were introduced today, dealing among other things with land settlement problems, government commissions, the question of land, and the representation on the various government commissions took up practically all of the afternoon session. The former question was raised by a motion by the Victoria unit, asking the convention to urge upon the government the land settlement act of the Dominion be altered to include any man who has served in his majesty's military or air forces during the late war, having honorable discharges. Discussion on this subject was long, and, becoming involved, the motion was sent back to the resolution committee.

The question of representation was raised by the introduction of a resolution by Delegate Carvington of Ottawa. This resolution pointed out the fact that on the civil service commission there is a member of the G. W. V. A., and called for a demand upon the government that the Army and Navy Veterans' Association have equal representation with the G. W. V. A.

FUR WORKERS IN MONTREAL LIKELY TO GO ON STRIKE

Employees in Big Industry
Growing Restless Because
of Conditions.

Montreal, July 25.—The latest threatening development in the local labor situation is that a general strike of workers in the fur industry may be called. The workers in this industry have been restless for some time and the dyers and dressers in one factory are already on strike. On account of the unsettled conditions in the industry, D. Mikol, international organizer for the Fur Workers' Union, has been sent to Montreal to investigate conditions.

The only change in the fur industry since yesterday he made his report on the situation to the local headquarters. Fur workers among the lowest paid labor in the city, wages lower in some cases by more than one-half than those paid the same class of workers in New York, Chicago and Boston. Wages have remained almost stationary since the outbreak of the war.

The leaders say that they will be obliged to call out the workers in the fur industry unless a favorable development takes place before tomorrow. Indications are that the fur workers' strike will soon be settled.

NEW PLAN UNDER CONSIDERATION May Reduce Army To Two Classes.

Paris, July 25.—All reserves of the French army, including the class of 1917, will be demobilized by the middle of October, according to plans completed by the Government and published today. There would remain in service members of the classes of 1915, 1916 and 1920.

Before the meeting of the new parliament, it is understood, Premier Clemenceau, as minister of war, and Marshal Petain, will draft a plan for the reduction of military service. This, it is said, may reduce the active army to the equivalent of two classes or less.

CONSTRUCTION ENGINEER DIES

Winnipeg, July 25.—A. C. Mackenzie, for many years an outstanding figure in the construction world of Western Canada, died suddenly today at the scene of his latest enterprise, the big power plant on the Winnipeg River. He was about 56 years of age.
