Looks for \$69 a Ton.

It is regarded in pulp and paper circles that there should be little difficulty in establishing the price of \$69 per ton for the supplies to Canadian users of newsprint after December 1 of last year. The reduction to \$66 per ton, it is regarded, was due to the lower manufacturing costs in July, August and September, 1918, and it was hoped that these months would be treated separately, allowing October and November, when higher costs were prevailing, to stand on their own merits. vailing, to stand on their own me This was the view taken by Judge Archer, one of the members of the tribunal, who entered a memorandum to this effect in the judgment, although not formally dissenting from the decision of his colleagues.
