## LORD CECIL HAS CONDEMNATION FOR IRISH RULE

Strongly Denounces Lloyd George Administration in Commons.

## INCLINED TO BE GLOOMY

Nobleman Looks Forward To Irish Republic As Humiliation.

LONDON, April 26.—In the House of Commons tonight Lord Robert Cecil strongly condemned the Irish administration. He said the situation in Ireland was graver than for centuries. Sixteen murders were committed in the first three weeks of April, as compared with 26 in the last three months, and during the last week there was one murder daily.

No arrests had been made, no one was punished and there was no protection for the public against violence. The Government, he declared, had shown serious vacillation and want of resource. If convictions could not be obtained under the existing law, the law must be altered, and if necessary, to bring prisoners to England for trial, officers should be used to protect the police.

The viceroy, said Lord Robert, should not be a soldier unless he had very special administrative capacity. Unless the Government proved its capacity to govern the country would drift through anarchy and humiliation to an Irish republic.

CLASH AT LIMERICK. LIMERICK, April 26.—(By Canadian Press).—A collision between British and Irish soldiers occurred last night in O'Connell street near the new barracks. Stones were thrown, and some of the soldiers were injured, one of them seriously. It is said that some shots were fired, but no one was wounded. It is reported that the trouble arose over a petty incident. Quiet was restored after two hours.

## ADMITS IRISH HELD IN PRISON

LONDON, April 26.—One hundred and seventy-nine Sinn Féin men are interned in Wormwood Scrubs Prison, according to a statement made in the House of Commons today by the home secretary, Edward Shortt, and of these all but five are on hunger strike. The policy of giving special ameliorative treatment to such men had always been followed in England, said the secretary, but he did not understand that these prisoners or their friends had demanded any improvement in their conditions.

## IRISH ARREST HOLD-UP SUSPECTS

MILLSTREET, County Cork, Ireland, April 26.—(By Canadian Press).—The Irish Republican army arrived in motor cars Sunday morning and took up positions in various parts of the town. They cut the telegraph wires before seizing and carrying off six persons who are suspected of implication in the hold-up of several bank officials last November, when £18,000 was stolen. It is the announced intention of the Republicans to hold the men until they disclose where the money is secreted.

## DEAL FOR DOMINION POWER NOT COMPLETE

HAMILTON, April 26.—Sir John Gibson and Lieut. Col. J. H. Moody of the Dominion Power and Transmission Company said today that the negotiations for the sale of their company to the hydro electric power have not been concluded. They say the hydro officials have been making investigations, and Sir John said that he has had conversations on the subject with Sir Adam Beck, but the deal has not been completed.

CAIRO, April 26.—Fighting is reported to be taking place between Arabs and British troops in Palestine. No details have been received here.

## CUTS TRACK TAX

TORONTO, April 26.—Hon. Peter Smith, provincial treasurer, tonight confirmed reports current for several days of a reduction in the recent tax on Ontario race tracks. Mile tracks will be assessed \$7,500 for each racing day, and half-mile tracks \$2,500. This is a reduction of \$2,500 a day in each case. The Government's decision was reached after strong representations on the proposed rates had been received from various parts of the province.

## FIVE YEARS TO MAKE EXCHANGE NORMAL--SMITH

Provincial Treasurer Says Situation Should Then Be Normal.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, April 26.—According to the best opinions of financial men, declared Provincial Treasurer Smith in the Legislature today, "if the exchange is not normal in the course of five years it will be nearly so."

Hon. Mr. Smith's own comment was that exchange is rapidly righting itself. The discussion arose over a query from Wellington May, Liberal member for North Perth, who, reading a newspaper item of provincial government bond transaction in England effected through Amellus Jarvis & Co., wanted to know if that company were in the employ of the Government, and if the bond sale in question had been given public offering.

Hon. Mr. Smith said the financial concern was not in the employ of the Government, and because of the necessity of haste, public tenders had not been asked, but tenders were asked from about 20 financial houses the transaction involved the redemption of about eight million dollars worth of bonds in England through the sale of bonds on New York, the exchange situation making the deal a profitable one to the province to the extent of \$1,217,320.

## EXCLUDE PRESS FROM LABOR CONFERENCE

OTTAWA, April 26.—(By Canadian Press).—By a vote of sixteen to three it was decided to exclude representatives of the press from meetings of the conference on labor laws. This was done on the recommendation of a committee appointed this morning to decide on the business to come before the conference. The order of business will be: First, workmen's compensation; second, factory legislation; third, mines regulation; fourth, minimum wage laws; fifth, industrial disputes act. Gustav Franco of Montreal objected to the exclusion of the press from the meetings of the conference. He said that delegates should not be afraid of having their discussion given to the public. Finally, however, it was decided to leave the newspaper reports in the hands of a committee of three, which would issue statements from time to time. Newspaper representatives then withdrew.

## EMERGENCY FUND FOR VETERANS CLOSED

OTTAWA, April 26.—The emergency fund for returned soldiers out of employment, issued from the Canadian Patriotic Fund for the last four months, terminated on Saturday, and no more money will be issued. The patriotic fund, it is understood, is as yet by no means exhausted and the question will soon arise as to what will be its ultimate destination. Many favor retaining the balance of the fund intact in case relief similar to what was issued this winter may be needed during the winter of 1920-21.

## MONTGOMERY HEADS G. A. OF UNITED VETS.

TORONTO, April 26.—L. M. Montgomery has been appointed managing director of the new soldiers' organization, the Grand Army of United Veterans. J. Harry Flynn is Dominion secretary, P. H. Ellis, Dominion secretary, and Fred Marsh, provincial organizer.

## BREAD ADVANCES IN TORONTO; NOW SELLS AT 13 CENTS A LOAF

Millers and Bakers Deny Causing of Rise.

TORONTO, April 26.—Bread advanced one cent a small loaf of a pound and a half in this city today, the new price being thirteen cents. C. B. Watts, local representative of the Ontario Millers' Association, said an advance in the price of bread could not be attributed to an advance in the price of flour, as there had been no advance in flour since last December. Mr. Watts said he had been told recently that the Toronto bakers were stocked with flour bought in December, 1919. Charles Clay, an organizer for the Canadian Federation of Labor, of which organization bakers and bread drivers are members, declared the increase in price of bread was not justified by the increase in wages given to the bakers and drivers.
