BRITISH RAILROAD TRUSTS.

Great Britain is about to get its first taste of the whip that can be used by railroad monopolies. Until recently the British railways were keen competitors for passenger and freight traffic and the public benefited thru the efforts made to secure customers by the provision of superior facilities and advantageous rates. Profits naturally diminished and of recent years dividends have been maintained with difficulty, the proportion of working expenses to gross receipts steadily inper cent. Indeed, efforts made to obtain parliamentary sanction to amaigamation schemes during 1909 all came to naught on account of the unwillingness of the promoters to accept the safeguards sought to be imposed in the public interest. Enormous Toli of the Epidemic Raging in Russia for One Week.

ST. PETERSBURG; Aug. 19 .- One week's cholera record for Russia shows 23,944 new cases of cholera and 10,725 deaths, bringing the total number of cases in Russia this year to 112,935. Of these, 50,287, or nearly half, have died, the exact percentage of mortality being 44.5.


