Blind Men Tell of Work Conducted at St. Dunstan's Hospital.

A large number of women interested in the cause the blind listened to ex-Corporal Veech and Lieutenant Baker, two blind soldiers, who gave interesting addresses at the Central Y. M. C. A. yesterday afternoon under the auspices of the Canadian Women's Association for the Welfare of the Blind. Mrs. W. A. H. Kerr presided: and literature was distributed setting forth the objects of the society, which are principally to assist the Canadian national library in national work for the blind, to interest the provinces and to encourage the learning of

Braille Mr. Veech told of life at the now noted St. Dunstan's, established in England by Sir Arthur Pearson. Here the social side is largely developed as an offset for the loss of sight. Dancing, rowing and walking in the beau-tiful park grounds are all encouraged, many volunteers giving their time daily to the assistance of the blind in

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
