REVERSALS OF FORM AT COLUMBUS TRACK

Such Performers as St. Frisco Among the Losers on Third Day.

Columbus, Ohio, Sept. 19.—Remarkable reversals of expected form characterized the third day's meeting of the Grand Circuit here at the Columbus mile track and not a single favorite was such horses as St. Frisco going down among the well-played losers. Two races, the free-for-all trot and the Hotel Hartman, \$5000 stakes for 2 1/2 pacers, developed great angles and a reduction of marks for the event and new marks for their winners.

Mabel Trask trotted two miles faster than her previous record and averaged a shade under 2:08 for her three heats. She lowered her former record of 2:03 1/2 in the second heat to 2:02 3/4. St. Frisco was not himself and only won third money in this event. Miss Directed beat him out for the place.
