• HOW TO FORM A •

Primary Union.

A Union may be formed in either towns, villages, or townships by the Primary teachers of all denominations, binding themselves together for improvement in their methods of working.

A meeting should be called, and the objects of the Union explained. A President, Secretary-Treasurer, Librarian, and Organist should be appointed.

All teachers in charge of the younger classes in the main school should be asked to join the Union, also *Mothers* should be invited and urged to attend.

There should be some part of the programme prepared especially with a view to getting the co-operation of the Mother.

There should be, if possible, a weekly meeting of the Union.

A Programme Committee should be appointed. The committee will arrange a programme for three months. The programme should be on the following lines: Devotional Exercises; Teaching of the next Sabbath's Lesson; Hints for Mothers; Singing of a Child's Song; Child Study Hints; Discussion of Class Work, or paper on a given Topic.

Programme Forms may be had ready to be filled in, at fifty cents a hundred, from Israel P. Black, 2,006 Park Avenue, Philadelphia, Pa.

The fee may be fixed by the Executive Committee of the Union.

Collections may be given to form a Circulating Library, and other little expenses in connection with the work.
