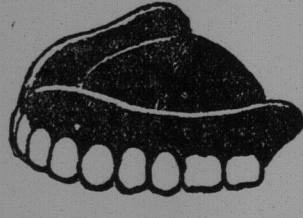

WHERE THE BALLS CAME FROM

Very few people know why in front of all pawn shops they see the sign of the three golden balls. It came about this way. In Italy during the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries the people were very poor, and consequently the Jews who were in the money lending line did a flourishing business at high rates of interest. In fact they were getting all of the surplus money of the poor into their hands, and consequently the people had no money to give to the church. The Medici family were then at the head of the Roman church, and as a protection to the financial interests of the same, established in nearly every city in Italy places where the people could borrow money on their chattels at reasonable rates of interest, and in this way they soon took the business out of the hands of the Jews. The arms of the house of Medici were three golden balls, and naturally they hung these out in front of the different loan banks operated by them, to signify that this great and wealthy family were guaranteeing the transactions of the institutions. In later years the contents of these places were often taken by the pope and sold publicly at auction to obtain money to carry on the work of the church. Napoleon rifled them during his invasion of Italy and the Medici family soon lost their prestige and the business fell into the hands of the Jews again, who always retained as their sign the arms of this once great and powerful family. In the past few years the Irish have taken it up, and on June 4th, 5th, and 6th the two great Irish Pawnbrokers will appear at the Opera House with matinee Wednesday. Go and see how liberal they are in dealing out laughter.
