Thought It Was a Joke

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 13—A despatch received here discloses how the first news of the accident at Honda reached the railroad officials. It is said that after the accident, Conductor Jones climbed the nearest telegraph pole and with a telegraph instrument provided for such purposes tapped one of the despatch wires with a connection with the San Luis Obispo division office and told of the wreck.

NINETY MINERS BURNED TO DEATH

Incendiarism May Have Caused Loss of "City of Cleveland" at Detroit Today.

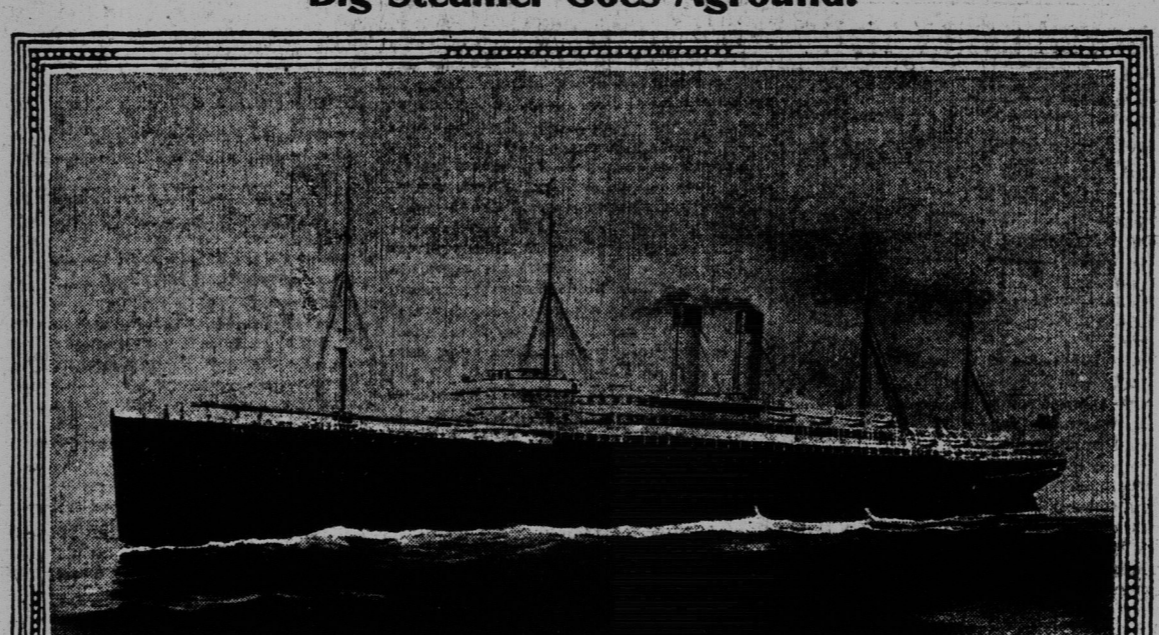
