Halifax, N. Hampton, N. B., June 6.—(Special)—A preliminary enquiry was held at the county court house, Hampton, on Saturday afternoon, before stipendiary Magistrate John March into a charge made by G. G. Scovill, dominion superintendent of dredges at St. John, against Francis H. McNair, of the parish of Norton, of an intent to extort money by threatening to accuse him of an offence unless certain conditions were complied with. It was found that this was not done, he would send the whole proceedings to the press and ask the general public how it was done. G. G. Scovill could sell and lease a post office and if he had, in the past year, he would have received \$100,000. M.P.P., of St. John, might be obliged to ask questions in parliament on the matter.
