**AMATEUR GOLF
CHAMPIONSHIPS**

Programme for Canadian
Events at Winnipeg Next
August—New Plans.

Winnipeg, Man., April 11.—A review
of the recently adopted programme for
the Canadian amateur golf championship
matches to be held here August 22 and
27, indicates a week of interesting play
with representatives from coast-to-coast
present for the initial games. A pre-
cedent will be established, for not only
will the handicap entry limit be reduced
to 12 from 14, but the qualifying round
will be entirely eliminated. Match play
will predominate from the start.

The following is the programme, ap-
proved by the Royal Canadian Golf
Association:
Amateur Championship of Canada—
Open to all amateurs who are members
of clubs belonging to the Royal Cana-
dian Golf Association in accordance
with by-laws 18 and 14, also to all
amateur players in good standing with
their respective associations. Handicap
limit 12. Play will start Monday morn-
ing, August 22, and will be match play
from the beginning. There will be no
qualifying round. The draw will be ar-
ranged in such a manner that by Mon-
day evening the number of competitors
in the championship will be reduced to
64. Each game will consist of 18 holes
match play, except the semi-finals and
final of the amateur championships,

which shall be 36. In the event of a tie
the match will continue till either player
wins a hole.

First Consolation—Entrants defeated
in the first game played in the cham-
pionship tournament will play in a first
consolation over the Elmhurst course,
which will begin on Tuesday a. m. and
continue to finals. Each game will con-
sist of 18 holes match play.

Vice-President's Cup—This competi-
tion will open on Wednesday morning,
and will be open to all contestants who
are not then competing in the cham-
pionship or first consolation. A qualifying
round will be played over the Pine
Ridge course on Wednesday on handicap
terms, and the 16 players returning the
lowest net scores will qualify to play off
by match play on handicap. Vice-
president C. P. Wilson, of the Royal
Canadian Golf Association, has donated
a cup for this competition.

Annual Open Handicap—Eighteen
holes, medal play, open to all amateurs,
handicap limited to 18 strokes. A prize
will be given for the best gross score.
Play-off of ties to be decided by the
committee.

Club Team Match—Open to teams of
four players from any club belonging
to the association. Prizes will be pre-
sented by the association to each player.
The team having the lowest aggregate
score in this match, 18 holes medal play
wins the team competition. A club
may enter one or more teams.

Inter-Provincial Match and East vs.
West Match—Details of these matches
will be arranged after the tournament
opens.

Additional—Each day after Monday
sweptakes competitions will be ar-
ranged at each of the following clubs:
St. Charles Country Club, Pine Ridge
Golf Club, Akrest Golf Club, Norwood
Golf Club, Assinibois Golf Club, Canoe
Golf Club, Southwood Golf Club, Elm-
hurst Golf Club and the Winnipeg Golf
Club.

COMMUNITY CHURCH.

Ministers See New Religious Power in
Spread of Plan.

A conference on the Community
Church movement, the first held in Am-
erica, began in the Church House, Park
avenue and Thirty-fourth street, New
York, last Wednesday. Speakers criti-
cized the church and held that it did not
serve as a means of social betterment.

"The existing sectarian church is, all
things considered, the most irreligious in-
fluence now at work in modern society,"
said Dr. Joseph E. McAfee. "The pur-
pose of the true religion is to unite the
people. But our churches only separate
them. Such separation is a betrayal of
true Christianity. It is un-American,
since it divides our democracy into com-
petitive and antagonistic groups. We
need to make a clean sweep of our
churches as they are organized today and
give the community a chance to express
itself naturally and of its own demo-

cratic will in religion."
"The existing denominational church
could not share in the solution of social
problems," said Dr. John Haynes
Holmes. "By the very nature of its or-
ganization it is concerned with private
and not public work, with the advance-
ment of theological ideas and not of so-
cial welfare. In spite of the social ap-
peals of our time the existing churches
remain ineffective. The Community
Church presents itself as an organization
of religion specifically on the basis of
community life, and therefore will serve
as a means of social betterment."

**PEASANT RIOTS IN WEST
SIBERIA REPORTED**

Riga, April 11.—Peasant riots in
western Siberia are reported in advices
from Moscow are said to have driven out
the so-called green army and have oc-
cupied Tobolsk, cutting off the town
from the trans-Siberian railroad.

SIX ARRESTED.

Six young men named Cameron, Le-
vine, Miller, Owens, Crawford and Col-
lins were arrested near Little Lepreau
yesterday morning after a search lasting
all night by Detectives Power, Biddis-
combe and Donahue, Provincial Con-
stable A. Garnett, and about 100 men
from the vicinity. They are alleged to
have broken into Mrs. Melanson's store
at Musquash, and also stolen a horse
and carriage, the property of James Mc-
Carthy. Early yesterday morning Percy
Lomax, Walter McPherson and Charles
Wilson captured three of the men, and
later the other three were taken into
custody by the local detectives. The
police do not think these are the men
who blew open the safe of the New Sys-
tem Laundry.

When J. W. Paulding was secretary
of the U. S. navy he wrote to the post-

master-general was informed of the af-

pen and the postmaster-general received
this: "The revenue for this office for
the quarter ending Sept. 30 has been 65
cents; its expenditures same period, for
candles and twine, 65 cents. Please in-
struct my successor to adjust balance."
