SCOTT DECLARES POMEROY DID THE SHOOTING

Says They Had Some "Home Brew" at Moore House

Makes Statement in the Greenville, Maine, Murder Case Differing From That of the Other Prisoner.

Dover, Maine, March 19.—J. C. Scott, who, with William Pomeroy, is under arrest charged with the murder of Robert C. Moore at Greenville on last Saturday night, in a statement last night asserted that he was innocent. He said that he accompanied Pomeroy to the Moore house to "obtain some home brew." Pomeroy has been accused by Mrs. Moore, who was wounded, of firing the shots that killed her husband.

Scott said that he and Pomeroy drank some of the liquor at Moore's house, which was a lodging place for woodmen, and were preparing to retire when Pomeroy started upstairs, entered the room where Moore and his wife had retired and fired several shots. He said he heard Moore cry out, then Pomeroy came down and forced him to leave the house and board a freight train for Canada. Pomeroy and Scott were taken from the train on the next day at Jackman and placed under arrest.

Scott's story does not agree with that told by Pomeroy, who soon after his arrest said that strange men had fired at them from the Moore house and driven them aboard the train at the point of revolvers.

LIQUOR QUESTION IN B. C. IS TO GO TO THE PEOPLE

Victoria, B. C., March 19.—Premier Oliver has promised to submit to the people of British Columbia a clear and distinct issue upon the question of prohibition or the sale of liquor under control of the government.

Three suggested amendments to the prohibition amendment act will be considered, namely, a country to be framed by the moderates, an act drafted by the government or suggestions or a framework, submitted by the moderates and a moderation act to be framed by the government, for which it will accept responsibility.

SHERBROOKE MAN TAKEN IN BOSTON

A Drug Case—Kennedy Says He Is Lumber Dealer and Real Estate Operator.

Boston, March 19.—Duncan J. Kennedy, who told the police he was a lumber dealer and real estate operator in Sherbrooke, Que., was arrested last night charged with violating the drug laws by having \$2,000 worth of morphine in his possession. According to the police he sold \$100 worth of the drug to a police officer in a hotel here.

Kennedy told the police that while he was in White River Junction, Vt., the morphine was sent to him by a Quebec druggist, who asked him to dispose of it in Boston.

Girls Arrested. Boston, March 19.—Miss Margaret J. Butterfield and Sybil Leonia Siler, both of Sherbrooke, Que., and each eighteen years old, were arrested yesterday on a charge of having drugs, morphine and cocaine in their possession. Their arrest came about following the arrest and confession of a Montreal man, apprehended on Wednesday, who said that he brought the drugs from Montreal for delivery to the young women, and had been doing so regularly for nearly a year.

COMMISSION FOR FAIR RENTS

The New York Journal of Commerce states that a resolution was presented in the board of aldermen of that city on Tuesday recommending to the state legislature that a rent commission be created.

The resolution, which was adopted, calls for the creation of a commission, with judicial or quasi-judicial powers, to fix the value of property to be rented as it existed on April 2, 1917, when President Wilson sent his war message to congress, taking into account the improvements added since then, and then fixing a reasonable rental of approximately ten per cent plus a reasonable cost of maintenance.

CHIEF RESIGNS

Police Official Said Private Life Probe Would Involve Innocent People.

(Canadian Press) Winnipeg, March 19.—Rather than have charges against his private life investigated on the ground that innocent persons would be involved in their detestment Leo Marcel, chief of police for St. Boniface since 1918, tendered his resignation yesterday. The action stopped an investigation on which had been ordered before Judge Prud'homme into accusations made by former Inspector Doherty, who was dismissed by Chief Marcel on Feb. 26.
