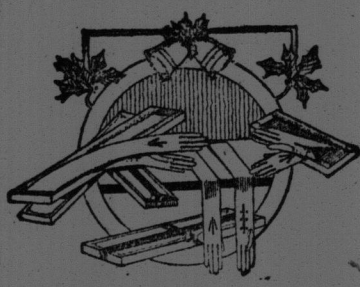

THE CALENDAR SEASON.

STEALING CHARGE

The preliminary hearing in the case of George Axel was begun in the police court this morning. He is charged with having stolen parts of two sets of harness from Alexander Day of 72 Adelaide street on Aug. 27. He was working at the time on the Alexander Hovan farm, Manawagonish road and Axel had been helping him. Mr. Day gave evidence this morning and the case was adjourned until Monday.

THE SCHOONERS

Schooner Empress, which has been unloading coal here, will sail today in ballast for Clark's Harbor. It is likely she will lay up there for the winter.

The schooner Scotia Queen, discharging coal at Lawton's wharf, fell away from the wharf at low tide and strained her hull considerably. Her position was adjusted on last night's tide and the work of unloading was continued this morning. It is expected that as soon as her cargo is all discharged she will go on the blocks for repairs.

EXPECT CHRISTMAS
TURKEY WILL COST
FROM 25 TO 28 CENTS

The Christmas bird will be fairly cheap this year. The market is well supplied with turkeys and indications were that on Monday hundreds would be brought to the city, causing a lessening in price. At present thirty cents a pound is the average, but before Christmas may be lowered to from 25 to 28 cents, according to the prophecies of some dealers in the country market today. They said the farmers were holding back until next week and the market would be liberally stocked.

Chickens were a little scarcer today and brought from \$1.25 to \$1.75. Beef was plentiful and will continue so during the holiday season at least, but the price will remain high. From 12 to 24 cents was asked today. Eggs are selling at 35 and 50 cents and butter from 30 to 35 cents a pound.

SIX MONTHS IN JAIL

John H. Pierce, given in charge by W. O. Stapleton, manager of the F. W. Woolworth Company, on charge of stealing small articles from their store in King street yesterday was brought before Magistrate Ritchie this morning. Mr. Stapleton said that Pierce bought six post cards but remained about an hour. One of the clerks spoke to him about the man and when he went to investigate he saw a small toy in his pocket. On making enquiries from the clerks he found that no toys of that description had been sold during the afternoon. Policeman Ross was called in and the arrest made.

Policeman Ross said that when he searched the prisoner he found a cake of soap and sixty-five cents in change. The magistrate said that there had been four times of begging before the court lately, and that under the dominion act a man was liable to nine months in jail for begging in the streets unless he had license from his clergyman dated within three months of the time of begging and stating that it was for some worthy object.

The prisoner pleaded guilty of the charge of stealing but said he had not been begging yesterday. He was sentenced to serve six months in jail with hard labor.

A QUICK VOYAGE

Saturnia Seven Days in Crossing Atlantic

Donaldson Liner Letitia arrived in Glasgow at three o'clock this morning, after a fast passage across the Atlantic. The steamer, after leaving St. John, called into Halifax and took on a consignment of apples, sailing from there at ten o'clock last Friday night. Allowing for the difference in time between Halifax and Glasgow, this would make the time of her passage just seven days.

TWO ORDINATIONS IN
ST. PAUL'S TOMORROW

St. Paul's church in the valley will be the scene of an ordination tomorrow when Rev. W. Best of Harcourt, will be elevated to the priesthood, and J. H. V. Done, of Durham, will be ordained deacons. The ordinations will be conducted by His Lordship Bishop Raymond assisted by Rev. F. B. Hopper, rector of St. Paul's. Ven. Archdeacon Raymond will present the candidates for ordination, and the bishop will preach.

The bishop arrived in the city today from Fredericton, and will be the guest of Sir Frederick Barker during his stay. The two young Englishmen reached the city last evening on a special train from Halifax with passengers from the steamer Empress of Britain. It is interesting to note that Mr. Done studied in England under the same tutor as did Rev. Mr. Best, but neither has ever, to his knowledge, seen the other.

TWO NEW POLICEMEN;
BOTH FOR CARLETON

Fredrick T. Cowan, aged twenty-three, was chosen for the police force today and were sworn in before Magistrate Ritchie.

These are the first regular appointments made to the police force for some time and although they will help to lessen the duties of the other policemen, the force is still several men short. Policemen Cowan and Watson are both strong and able bodied young men. They will go on duty at once and will both be sent to the West Side.

J. B. LeBLANC DIES SUDDENLY

Formerly in Millinery Business in St. John — Found Dead by Wife

Many in St. John will be sorry to learn of the death of J. B. LeBlanc of Shediac. He was in his accustomed health and had been selling fish during Thursday afternoon. Mrs. LeBlanc was out when he returned, but coming home a short time afterwards she was shocked to find her husband dead on the kitchen floor. Mr. LeBlanc was for some years in the millinery business in St. John, a member of the firm of Skinner & LeBlanc. Some years ago he retired from active business life and since that time had made his residence in Shediac. His wife, who was Miss Elizabeth Bourque of Fox Creek, will have the sympathy of many in her bereavement.

NEW ST. STEPHEN PASTOR.
