IS THE LATESTNews of a Week in Society
of London

MRS. KEPPEL AS HOSTESS

Lord Kitchener's Guest Catches
Measles on Way to Egypt and
is Quarantined—Paris Women
Are Painting Faces Blue and
Mauve

London, March 8.—Quite a cheery spot
in our Lenten days was a "telephone"
dance given this week by Mrs. George
Keppel at her house in Grosvenor street.
Mrs. Keppel spent the early part of the
winter at Florence and then went on to
Klingendal, the house of her sister, the
Baroness de Bienen at The Hague, a
very favorite pastime of hers.
Lately they returned to London, and
Mrs. Keppel, finding life a "bore," most
of the more lively members of society be-
ing abroad just now, persuaded her mo-
ther to get up the dance all in a hurry.
While they were in Florence, there was
a perfect rage for "head-dress dinners,"
and other "dressing-up" festivities, and
Violet Keppel came back to town with
her head full of all sorts of new ideas in
this way.

Although the guests had so little time
to get anything ready—they had only
twenty-four hours' invitation on the tele-
phone—some wonderfully good costumes
were evolved. Most of them were of the
comic order, and as such arrived much
his or her entrance into the ballroom,
shouts of laughter went up from the rest
of the folk.

George Keppel was a comic Dutch peasant
and Lord Albemarle, his elder brother,
a country squire in a very good frock.
He had also "donned" the bucolic com-
plexion and locks of tow hair generally
associated with that attire. A perfect
storm greeted the entrance of Lady Elizabeth
Keppel, Lord Albemarle's only daughter,
who was dressed as a caricature
of Dolly Varden, and one of her young
brothers accompanied her in a "down-
and-out" dress suit and a very good rose
while Lady Albemarle was so effectively
disguised as a judge in wig and gown that
for a long time nobody recognized her.
Mrs. Cecil Higgins came as a girl of
twelve, and Lady Curzon, Lady Sarah
Wilson and Mrs. Montagu Wilson appear-
ed as three of Bluebeard's wives.

No orchestra was engaged, the guests
taking it in turn to play for the dances,
and several of them sang and recited, as
well. Towards the end of the evening,
Violet Keppel and several of her friends
gave an extremely clever imitation of some
of the scenes from Der Rosenkavalier,
in which show, Miss Keppel appearing as
the rose-bearer and wearing the mightily
becoming riding dress worn by that char-
acter in the first act. As a grand finale,
the farandole was danced by all in the
highest of spirits, and everybody decided
that they had not spent such a thoroughly
enjoyable evening for an age.

Among the folks who seemed to be en-
joying themselves most was young Prince
Paul of Serbia, a son of Prince Arseno
Karagorevitch, who has been fighting
for his country against the Turks. Prince
Paul has come over here to put in a
spell of work at Oxford. He is a Christian
Church, and he and the Prince of Wales
lastened to make friends with one an-
other, and are now to be found together
in the rooms of one or the other, no doubt
"comparing notes." Prince Paul is a nephew
of the present king, and he was only
ten years old at the time of the terrible
murder of King Alexander and Queen
Draga. For the matter of that, too, he
has never been in Serbia in his life.

Talking of dances reminds me that a
very successful dance was given last week
at Cannes by the Grand Duke Michael
and the Countess Torby to celebrate the
coming of age of the Countess Zia, their eld-
est daughter. There was a dinner-party
first, at which many of the countess's
young friends were present, and which
was quite a gay affair. After dinner, nearly
everybody in Cannes turned up and
dined with great energy till the early
hours. Among the guests were: Mr. and
Mrs. Winston Churchill, the latter look-
ing particularly lovely in her favorite
white.

It was hard lines for poor Monica Grenfell
to get measles on board ship on her
way out with her mother and father to
stay with Lord Kitchener at Cairo. It
has rather upset their plans, too, for al-
though she had almost recovered when
they arrived at Alexandria, she could not
go on to Cairo, because of the infection,
and she and her mother had to stay be-
hind at the hospital at Alexandria, until
her "quarantine" was over.

This trip was looked upon as a signal
honor for her, as Lord Kitchener has never
given such an invitation to a girl before,
although people say his reputation as a
woman-hunter is on the wane. However,
that may be, he certainly does not re-
gard the good things of this life with such
scurm as he was supposed to be in proof
that, people in Egypt are pointing to the
magnificent ballroom which he has just
had added to the agency there, and where
the mass of iron has already been seen
footing it with "mere women," like a man
in his early twenties.

few days ago, which was meant to be in
his honor.
