WHOLESALE ARRESTS OF DETROIT ALDERMEN ON BRIBERY CHARGES

Detroit, Mich., July 26.—Eight aldermen and the secretary of the common council committees were placed under arrest this afternoon on charges of accepting bribes and conspiracy to accept a bribe for their votes and influence in the passing of a measure affecting city property recently transferred to the Wabash railroad.

At least six other arrests of aldermen are expected at any moment and it is alleged that \$3,700 passed hands in sums of from \$100 to \$1,000. The bribery was committed under the personal supervision of Detective William J. Burns.

The aldermen arrested are: Thomas Clinch, president of the council, who is alleged to have received \$1,000; E. J. Schneider, Jr., secretary of council committees, and also secretary of the American League of Municipalities, who is charged with having received \$1,000; Alderman Martin J. O'Brien, who is charged with having received \$200; Alderman Patrick O'Brien, who is charged with having received \$200; Alderman Louis T. Gray, who is charged with having received \$200; and Alderman Louis Bruza, who is charged with having received \$200.

Alderman Clinch has long been known in city politics as a "boss" Tom, and when arrested this afternoon it is said he turned over \$1,000 and made a complete confession. Schneider, secretary of the council, who is charged with having received \$1,000, was arrested in his office. He had not received any money, but the officers found that he went to the office with the detective, who seized under the guise of West Michigan Realty Co. a prominent manufacturer, and discovered the officers who had just arrested Clinch. It is said he also made a confession.

The detectives claim that they have caught these men with the marked money. The investigation, which culminated in the arrests today, has been going on since February, when rumors of graft in the real-estate business began to circulate. Mayor William B. Thompson sought the services of detectives and Arthur Green, a prominent manufacturer, agreed to finance the probe.

Soon after the investigation was begun, a Detroit street on the grounds that it wanted to erect a warehouse, was granted an increase of shipping facilities. U. S. REPEALS RECIPROcity LEGISLATION

Washington, July 26.—The senate by a vote of thirty-seven to twenty-one today repealed the reciprocity law which would extend the corporation tax law to individuals and partnerships on income in excess of \$5,000.

The bill as passed included a provision for the repeal of the reciprocity law and a substitution of a 2 per cent rate on print paper. Senator Borah's income tax bill was defeated.

The excise measure would levy upon all persons, firms or partnerships an annual tax equal to one per cent of the net income in excess of \$5,000. Senator Cummins' amendment to the bill, which would exempt from the tax the net income of a partnership in the hands of the partners, was defeated by a vote of thirty-seven to twenty-one.

Automatic Redemption.

Of course, a few old and dirty bank notes are met with, but the average life expectancy of a bank note is only thirty days. The notes are quickly collected by the clearing banks and sent back to the issuing bank for redemption through the clearing-house. In the case of Dominion notes, however, there is not the same self-acting machinery for redemption and replacement.

Canadians have always been able to obtain gold in any quantity desired, but the preference for a metallic currency existed. The only difference now is that the gold is obtained in the form of Dominion notes, which are formerly it was coined at the English Mint or at Washington.

The intrinsic value is the same. Both American gold has the same privilege in Canada as the home product. The temporary increased demand for gold money is due to the fact that it is now being used as a medium of exchange between Canadian and American design.

All the Canadian gold replaces American in the reserves of the banks. The essential purpose of the gold reserves is for international settlements, since Dominion notes are full legal tender and are used exclusively due to the greater convenience in handling in the settlement of balances between Canadian banks. The Banking Act prescribes that 40 per cent of the reserves held by chartered banks should be in the form of Dominion notes. Much of the weight held by the banks is in the form of gold bars of uniform length and weight and assayed to uniform fineness.

Loss from Abrasion.

Experience has shown that there is less loss from abrasion in transit when the gold is in the form of coins than when it is in the form of bars. In addition, there are considerable quantities of American gold coins and some British Canadian gold coins are not legal tender in the United States, although they are perfectly legal here and there is no disparity between intrinsic and par value. Nevertheless, although bars are the most preferable form for the settlement of balances between Canadian and American banks, American coins are more desirable than Canadian for the purpose.

There is no reason, however, to be disappointed at the failure of the new Canadian gold piece to come into popular favor. It is immediately redeemable on demand, it is equally secure and more convenient than the metal. In addition it can be kept almost as clean.

APFARIS INCUBA (Benger Commercial)

THAW REFUSED HIS LIBERTY

White Plains, N. Y., July 26.—Harry K. Thaw, in the eyes of the law is still sane and must remain in the asylum where he was placed on Feb. 1st, 1908, after he had killed Stanford White. Justice Keogh of the Supreme Court today denied Thaw's application for freedom. The court took the ground that Thaw's release would be dangerous to public safety.

This is the third attempt made by Harry K. Thaw to gain his liberty from Matteawan Asylum for the Criminal Insane on a writ of habeas corpus. The sole question tried before Justice Keogh without a jury was whether Thaw is now sane.

During the present trial which began on June 17 and was much briefer than the previous habeas corpus proceedings, Mrs. Evelyn Nesbit Thaw took the witness stand and Thaw himself was called to testify to the authenticity of several letters written by him. LUNCHES FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN

The intimate connection between hungry bodies and hungry minds is receiving particular attention in European cities. In Berlin 7,000 pupils in one year had school lunches furnished them; in Hamburg 3,000 while in Leipzig the number thus aided amounted to 2,200, according to information received at the United States Bureau of Education. In Munich and Nuremberg both breakfast and lunch are furnished to needy pupils. In Ludwigshafen bread and milk are given each morning to the children who have reached school without having been fed. In Belgium soup and bread are given to the impoverished pupils; in Lecce alone in 1910, 384,297 rations were supplied. In Italy it is considered part of the duty of the authorities to be on the lookout for people who seem not to be properly nourished, and to provide them with food. In Norway substantial lunches are furnished by the city authorities, a central kitchen being used for this purpose.
