Natural History Society

The June meeting of the Natural History Society was held in the rooms last night. There was a large attendance, the president, Senator Ellis, being in the chair. J. W. Wilson, acting delegate to the meeting of the Royal Society in Ottawa, gave his report of the meetings of that body.
An informal report of the projected summer field meetings was given by Dr. Hay and a resolution was passed that the Fredricton Natural History Society be asked to join in the excursion to Douglas Mountain. Dr. Hay then read abstracts of several papers on various branches of the Miramichi River giving an account of their physical geography. Prof. Ganong sent an abstract of a paper on the Sable gale, which gale was accompanied by a very high tide.
The members elected were: William Whitaker, Jr., and the Misses Florence Harvey and Ellen K. Melrose, junior associate. Several valuable donations of Indian head work, Indian pipes, porcupine quill work and moose hair embroidery were received from the Misses Jack, and some botanical specimens from California by Mrs. Youngblood.

THE OLD CORN BROOM.

BOARD OF TRADE

At the monthly meeting of the board of trade yesterday afternoon a resolution condemning the contract lately made between the government and the Pickford & Black Steamship Company, for a service to the West Indies, was adopted. It places a twenty-two day service from this city and an eleven day service from Halifax, and asking that such changes be made as would ensure making St. John and Halifax alternate ports of departure, was passed unanimously.
