Huston Retains Share.
New York, Jan. 4.—Colonel T. R. Huston has decided to retain his part ownership of the New York American League baseball club, which it was announced some time ago he would dispossess of to Colonel Jacob Ruppert. Colonel Huston said he would retain his part ownership indefinitely, although his stock is for sale to "any reputable person." He denied that a deal had failed over the purchase price, reported to be \$1,125,000.
Keeler at Bat.
New York, Jan. 5.—Old-time baseball lovers declared that a fitting appreciation that might be called into the monument of Willie Keeler, who died at his Brooklyn home, could be: "He hit 'em where they ain't." Keeler's stand at the plate was one of the most peculiar in baseball. He stood erect, his bat "choked" and straight against his slim body. Flat footed, he stood the batter's dead line. Then he turned only his head toward the pitcher. The batsman tried to find a frail side of a body that really seemed to conceal the bat. There was no waiting or theatrical threat of a hit. When the ball came streaming to the plate, Keeler met it this way or that, full force, tap, half swing or poke as the emergency prompted him.
He was a master workman.

CURLING.

Two Teams Suspended.
Montreal, Jan. 5.—As a result of Jimmie Roy, former Wanderers' professional, having played with Chicoutimi against the Sons of Ireland in the Provincial League at Quebec on Wednesday, all the players on both sides stand suspended, according to the announcement of James MacDonald, chairman of the registration committee of the Quebec branch of the A. A. U. of C. here, yesterday. Mr. MacDonald issued a warning on Wednesday night to all amateur hockey players that any who played with or against Roy would be suspended.

Montreal, Jan. 5.—Speaking of the suspension of Jimmie Roy, C. C. Holst, president of the Quebec A. H. A., said last night that he had taken the matter up with the Quebec City registration committee. In reply to a warning that if a card was refused Roy, a break of the Quebec Hockey League away from the association would be inevitable, he said that in that event the league teams would not be eligible to play in the Allan Cup elimination games nor to play exhibition games in the U. S. He said that if a card had been issued to Roy it would be cancelled by the governing body, as Roy was refused a player's card a year ago, and conditions had not changed in the meantime. He said the ruling of the A. A. U. of C. would be adhered to by the Quebec A. H. A.

WRESTLING.
Zbysko Defeats Walker.
Boston, Jan. 5.—(Canadian Press.)—Stanislaus Zbysko, former world's champion wrestler, last night defeated George Walker, claimant of the Canadian heavyweight championship in two straight falls. The first fall was scored in one hour, two minutes and fifteen seconds with a double toe lock, when Walker yielded the fall in protection when he was thrown. The second fall came in four minutes and thirty seconds with a toe hold.

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CROWDED TO SEE ARBUCKLE FILM

New York, Jan. 5. — (By Canadian Press.) — Following the recent announcement that Roscoe (Patty) Arbuckle would be allowed to resume the making of motion pictures, a local theatre showed one of his early pictures, and the public was so anxious to get in that they broke the glass in the doors.
Whenever the public are told they oughtn't to see a thing, said Oscar Hammerstein, in commenting on the incident, "that's the very thing they are most anxious to see."
Arthur Hammerstein offered a million dollars to the Famous Lasky Corporation for three finished Roscoe Arbuckle pictures held by them. Failing this, Mr. Hammerstein said he would be willing to exhibit the pictures on a commission basis, for ten per cent. of the profits. He was willing, he said furthermore, to present the films in those portions of the country where sentiment against Arbuckle had seemed to be most antagonistic. Mr. Hammerstein asserted that he had always believed Roscoe Arbuckle to be all right.
