We believe that this Book is the most final authority of the Church, and he would like to say that he had the most profound, earnest, and unshakable conviction that this Book is the inspired Word of God. The holy Book is a Book from God and by God. The circulation of the Bible in the world, and its translation into foreign tongues, is considered nothing less than a miracle. There are a great many Bible Societies; fifty million copies of the Word of God have gone forth from the printing houses of the world during the last ten years. This Book, written in the dead languages, is the freshest Book on earth; it is read by every class and condition of men, and the older one gets the more he enjoys it. The Bible tells about our destiny, about our soul, and about our God; and as long as this Book goes forth, the Kingdom of Christ will spread upon earth. In speaking of the length of time that we have had the Bible, compared with other books, it had been remarked that "Robert Elsmere" had undermined the foundations of Christianity. Now, he would venture to say, that during the past year not over fifty copies of "Robert Elsmere" had been sold in the Maritime Provinces. The book that was said to threaten to undermine Christianity had gone to the wall, and the Book that it sought to crush was rising higher and higher in favor with all nations. In conclusion, Mr. Hague read a charming little anecdote.
