BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES.

A very slight earthquake was felt in San Francisco yesterday. Twenty thousand garment workers are on strike in New York City.

The purchase price by A. E. Rao of the Lindsay Co. of Ottawa is put at \$500,000.

George Gould of Brantford was fined \$50 and costs for slashing Wesley Scott with a razor.

King Manuel of Portugal has accepted an invitation from King Edward to visit England in the early autumn.

William Whyte, second vice-president of the C.P.R., will be allowed to remain in the service until he is 60 or two years over the regular superannuation limit.

Percy Woodruff, an aeronaut, who has figured in several sensational balloon ascensions in the east, was barred by the upsetting of a launch in the Hudson off Yonkers, N.Y.

The plans for the visit of Lord Charles Bessborough, with Premier Whitney, the Cabinet Ministers and other members of the Legislature, include a seven-hour daylight visit to Cobalt.

Winnipeg and western labor men intend to run W. J. Bartless, ex-president of the Trades and Labor Congress, for president of the Dominion Trades Congress, which meets in Quebec in September.

Prince Hermann of Saxe-Weimar-Eisenach, the heir presumptive to the Grand Duchy of Weimar, has renounced the succession of himself or his heirs to the throne of Cobalt. In the new leases one of the clauses reads that if one conviction has been registered against any of the lessees of the land or any of his tenants, the lease will be promptly cancelled.

Prohibition Bad for Cities. Chicago, Aug. 5.—That the establishment of prohibition in Chicago, or other large cities, would be impracticable and would put a premium on the illegal sale of intoxicating drinks, was the opinion expressed yesterday by Cardinal James Gibbons of Baltimore.

Coming from the only cardinal of the Roman Church in America, and in Chicago at a time when fifteen thousand Catholic total abstinence advocates are gathering here to adopt measures for a further advancement of their cause, the observations of Cardinal Gibbons are considered of especial importance.

"In the rural parts of the country and in the smaller towns and cities there are signs of progress, which must mean widespread prohibition. However much I am in favor of total abstinence, though, I fear that in the larger cities like Chicago it would not prove feasible," he said.

Suicides After Whipping.

Hartford, Aug. 5.—Because she had received a whipping in the morning, thirteen-year-old Clara Braithwaite last evening hanged herself in her father's orchard.

She chose a tree which her father, G. J. Braithwaite, an hotelkeeper, would pass on his way home.

Neighbors, however, discovered the body about 7 o'clock, when it was thought there were signs of life, but as telephone wires were out of order it was not for over an hour that doctors could be secured.

The little girl hanged herself with a strap, and she had drawn her legs up to be clear of the ground.

It appears the girl had been chastised by her stepmother yesterday morning. She was around the village yesterday in a despondent mood, and was seen in the vicinity in which the body was found. She had been out gathering apples previous to this at a neighbors.

Perhaps Fatally Hurt.

Guelph, Aug. 5.—Arthur Skinner, commercial traveler, brother of Dr. Skinner, sustained serious injuries yesterday morning and may not recover. Falling from a load of hay, he was trampled under the feet of the frightened horses.

With the intention of working on the farm for a short time for his health, Skinner had gone to the country. Yesterday morning was his first on the farm.

New Fisheries Regulations.

Ottawa, Aug. 5.—Information has been received by the Government to the effect that the new international regulations to govern the fisheries of Canada and the United States agreed to by Prof. E. E. Prince and Prof. David Starr Jordan will not go into effect until 1911. They will be published simultaneously in December next, so that a full year's notice will be given to all concerned.

Child Killed by Train.

Hagersville, Aug. 5.—Yesterday morning about five miles from Hagersville, the two-year-old son of Mrs. J. Fyle, while playing on the railway track, was struck and instantly killed by a train.

About 18 months ago the child's father, during a snow storm, was killed about the same place by the train.

The crossing is a level one.

Losses Hand In Threshing Machine.

St. Mary's, Aug. 5.—At the farm of W. H. Graham, when John McMaster, employed by R. S. Lang, impeller agent, had his left hand taken off just above the wrist in the cutting box of a new threshing machine which was being put in operation for the first time. McMaster was helping to put up the machine.

Defective electric wiring damaged the plant of the Hespeler Machinery Co.

WORK AMONG THE OLD BOYS

About Completed—Over Four Thousand Invitations Have Been Sent Out.

To ascertain the whereabouts of and get in touch with the Old Boys and Old Girls has been a task, greater by far than was ever supposed by the most enthusiastic and industrious member of the local committee at the inception of the Reunion movement. Yet with the splendid organization that has been accomplished both here and in the cities, towns and villages where the Old Boys are to be found, the sympathy and support of practically all of them have been enlisted in preparing for the home-coming. The Caledonia Society has received encouraging co-operation both from citizens and Old Boys who have been called upon to take an active part in the organization work and it is gratifying to the Society to be able to state that better organization work could not have been accomplished. At the present stage the work among the Old Boys is nearly completed. They have worked hard and faithfully, and so well have they conducted their work that they are now in a position to snatch a rest before the fun commences in a little over a week.

FOUR THOUSAND INVITATIONS.

Over four thousand invitations have been sent out by the Caledonia Society but should it be that anyone has been overlooked the Society will cheerfully issue an invitation if the name and address are left with either Mayor Sutherland or Secretary of the Old Boys' Committee, S. A. Gibson. It may be that in making out their lists citizens omitted the names of some to whom they desire invitations sent. There is still time in which to send out invitations and if the names and addresses, plainly written, are handed in to Mr. Gibson or the Mayor, they will receive prompt attention.

INTERESTING LETTERS.

It is evident from the correspondence that is received from day to day by the Committee that all the Old Boys are anticipating a most enjoyable week. Their letters, as a rule, are couched in language of "a lighter vein" which would indicate that there is truly much happiness in anticipation.

The following letter has been received by Mayor Sutherland from Mr. E. Garande, who will be remembered by many citizens as a member of the Chronicle staff a number of years ago.

"I notice by the Toronto paper that the Caledonia Society of Ingersoll, are going to have a Reunion of the Old Boys and Old Girls, and that one of its attractions is to be a 10-mile Marathon race, for a handsome prize. I intend to be a contestant in the Marathon race, and to show that I am a rather speedy Old Boy, I may say that the last evening after supper I made a run of ten miles in four minutes and 45 seconds, and before breakfast on the following morning I covered the same distance in exactly twelve minutes, and at the finish did not show the least distress. To be frank, however, I may say that the former distance was covered on a T.R. freight, while the latter remarkable run was made on a C.P.R. express. However, I will run the Old Boy or Old Girl for that matter, any distance they desire, either from Toronto to Winnipeg, either for fun, money or marbles."

TORONTO OLD BOYS.

The Caledonia Society is particularly pleased with the good work done by the Old Boys in Toronto. Although the Old Boys in the Queen City were somewhat late organizing the work was undertaken by "huskies" in the fullest sense of the term and has been carried to completion with a most energetic and business-like swing.

The following letter, received from Mr. Tom Gibson, Secretary of the Toronto committee will be read with interest.

"You have asked me to tell you what we are doing in Toronto, toward the Reunion in Ingersoll. Well, we have everything canned and on 'ice' ready for the starting gun on the 14th. We have dug up every Old Boy and Girl who have ever made Ingersoll his or her home and they will all be there.

We are bringing up a ball team of Ingersoll Old Boys of about the vintage of '90, who say they can clean up anything that you have in the old bag. Maybe they can. We have also organized an engaged a Rube Band made up of our best musicians. They will furnish a little music and we hope, a lot of fun.

Charlie Bailey is coming, so please enter him for the Marathon. Getting everything ready as we are all coming and bringing the cat, the pup and the parrot along so we can stay a few days when we get there."

MR. RUSSELL B. MAYBEE WILL ENGAGE IN BUSINESS THERE.

Mr. Russell B. Maybee who left on a business trip to the West several weeks ago has decided to locate at Fort William.

The Fort William Times-Journal says:—

"After looking over the good towns of western Canada, Russell B. Maybee for 10 years one of the leading jewelers of Ingersoll, Ont., has decided that Fort William has them all beaten and he will locate at the head of the lakes."

Mr. Maybee decided to leave his old town and he spent a month looking over the opportunities in the growing west. He took his time about it and his decision to locate here was arrived at after deliberate consideration.

While here to-day Mr. Maybee made arrangements to have a building erected for him on Simpson street, just above the Murphy block. By the terms of the agreement it is to be ready for occupancy October 1. Mr. Maybee left this afternoon to make arrangements to close his business in Ingersoll and move to Fort William.

MARATHON BICYCLE RACE

WON BY WALTER ANDREWS FORMERLY OF INGERSOLL.

Toronto, Aug. 4.—In the 26-mile Marathon bicycle race to-night, Walter Andrews, W. Anderson, and H. McDonald were winners in the order named. The race started with a motor pace, though Andrews was the only man who was able to stand the pace, he gaining almost a lap when the motor was recalled.

Andrews also won the special prizes for leading the field at the 5, 10 and 15 mile marks, the 20 mile special falling to the lot of George Young, who just nosed Anderson out at the mark. The winner's time was 1:15.48.

CALLED TO DORCHESTER

REV. MR. BURNETT, OF MOLESWORTH, INVITED BY PRESBYTERIAN CONGREGATION.

At a meeting of the congregation of the Dorchester Presbyterian church held Tuesday it was decided to invite Rev. Mr. Burnett, of Molesworth to the pastorate. Elder Angus McNeiven of Ingersoll, was appointed to prosecute the call.

Rev. Alex. Henderson, interim moderator, presided and the names of nine ministers were submitted. Messrs. Day, Gilmore and Angus Armour were appointed scrutineers. The first vote stood; Rev. Mr. Johnson 9; Rev. Mr. Burnett 17; Rev. Mr. Ross 4; Rev. Mr. McKay 1. The second ballot showed: Rev. Mr. Burnett 17; Rev. Mr. Johnson 9; Rev. Mr. Ross 12. The final vote stood; Rev. Mr. Ross 16; Rev. Mr. Burnett 23; and subsequently by the call to Mr. Burnett was made unanimous by a standing vote.

DETROIT RIVER TUNNEL

LAST OF BIG TUBES SUNK INTO POSITION.

Windsor, Aug. 4.—Without a hitch to mar the occasion the last of the big submarine tubes for the new Michigan Central tunnel was sunk in the Detroit River today. Water was let into the tubes in the presence of a great crowd of interested spectators who lined the shore.

The big tube settled to the river bed very slowly, and it was fully an hour before it rested on the bottom. But for the blowing of whistles on the tunnel boats and the ear of the river was no ceremony. The tunnel will be in operation before the snow flies.

The concert at Fairmount Park last evening was well patronized. The programme was one of much interest, the comic songs by Mr. Reg. Bloer being particularly pleasing features.

POWER STATION CONTRACTS LET

For Toronto and London—Contracts For Remaining Eight Will Be Let Next Week

Toronto, Aug. 5.—Contracts for two transformer stations, required for the Government transmission system, were let at a meeting of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission, attended by Hon. Adam Beck and Mr. W. K. McNaught, M.P.E., yesterday.

The station for the city of Toronto will be built by Whitehall and Sons of Toronto, who submitted the lowest tender amounting to \$38,500. Hyatt Brothers, London, will build the London station for \$23,500. Contracts for the remaining eight buildings at Woodstock, Berlin, Paris, Stratford, St. Mary's, Preston, St. Thomas, and Guelph will be let next week.

Hayman & Sons have commenced the construction of the stations at Niagara Falls and Dundas and will complete the work in December. The erection of the transmission towers and the telephone lines is progressing very satisfactory. Two gangs of men are engaged in the former task and another will be added next week, when the contractors will be in a position to set in place 15 towers a day.

REUNION WEEK

CITIZENS REQUESTED TO UNITE WITH SOCIETY IN DECORATING.

Don't wait until the last minute to decorate in the advice of those desirous of seeing the town beautified for Reunion week as never before. The Reunion is now less than two weeks distant and the time will be found short indeed.

Plans have already been made for the decorating of the principal streets on a most elaborate scale. The decorations will eclipse anything ever witnessed here and will doubtless impress the Old Boys and Old Girls with the fact that no efforts have been spared to make the town as bright as possible during their sojourn. A number of arches have been promised and these will be very attractive.

According to reports from the various organizations several thousand visitors are expected and citizens generally are requested to do all in their power towards improving the appearance of the town. It is hoped that there will be a liberal display of flags and hunting at every home.

PLAYED PART OF HERO

INGERSOLL BOY RESCUED GIRL FROM DROWNING IN INDIANAPOLIS.

Howard Petrie, an Ingersoll boy at present in Indianapolis, played the part of a hero recently when he rescued Pearl Franklin, 19 years old, from drowning in that city. In his account of the affair an Indianapolis paper says:—

"Her rescuer, who plunged into the canal and, seizing the drowning girl by the hair, swam with her to the shore, was Howard Petrie, a young Canadian, who is visiting in the city, at 1806 Brighton boulevard."

"Petrie saw the girl in the water and ran to the bank. It was several moments before he could locate the girl. As she came to the surface the second or third time he jumped in. Petrie is an expert swimmer and after a short struggle, reached the shore with the drowning girl."

"Several residents in the vicinity came from their homes in answer to Petrie's shouts and assisted him in resuscitating the young woman. She was all but drowned and when she was roughly about the bank for some time before she showed signs of life. Until the man did not know the age, sex or color of the person he rescued."
