MADEID, Jan. 7.—United States minists ter Grubb, has indicated the desire of his Government to negotiate a reciprocity treaty with Spain, on the understanding that the treatment granted to American imports in the Spanish West Indies should not be extended to imports from other countries, and that the United States, in exchange, would partly exempt cuban sugars and tobaccos from the imposts of the McKinley tariff.

It is understood the Spanish Government, also the West Indian colonies, are agreeable to this overture, but until all her European treaties expire in 1892, Spain cannot grant the United States any reciprocity that European powers cannot also claim under the "Favored nations" clauses.
