Fair Attendance at N. B. Medical Society Meeting

FREDERICTON, N. B., July 17.—The 25th annual meeting of the New Brunswick Medical Society opened here this morning in the city council chamber. There was a fair attendance of the medical fraternity. The president, Dr. E. T. Gaudet, occupied the chair and Dr. A. A. Murray, of Sussex, acted as secretary. After the usual formalities the president read his address which was one of an excellent character. On motion of Dr. McInerney, who highly complimented the speaker, seconded by Dr. Purdy, the address was referred to a committee composed of Drs. Irvine, Purdy and Day.

Dr. W. H. McVey, of Bathurst, read a highly interesting paper on the adulteration of food products. Dr. McInerney on behalf of Dr. McLaren, stated that an effort was being made in St. John to form a branch of the British Medical Society and that arrangements were being made to have a private car at the disposal of the provincial doctors going to Toronto in August for the meeting of the British Medical Association.

The treasurer's report showed a balance of \$1,303.27.

Dr. Vanvleet read a most interesting paper by Dr. Murray, of Fredericton Junction, and followed it with a paper of his own describing a case of a man being kicked by a horse. Both papers were spoken highly of by the meeting.

SHALL NOT DRINK WHISKY
BRUCHES' COMMANDMENT

Archbishop Expects to Work Regeneration of the People in a Few Years.

MONTREAL, July 15.—Mgr. Bruches, who has just returned from a pastoral visit extending over thirty parishes, where his grace has been looking into the progress of the temperance crusade started six months ago, declares that if the government of the Catholic bodies will do their part, the whole people will be regenerated in a few years. Mgr. Bruches does not, however, expect to make a temperance man out of an habitual drunkard, but the archbishop will attempt what he calls the alcoholic education of the young.

Formerly, he says, the children were taught not to lie, steal or cheat, but hereafter "thou shalt not drink whisky" will be added to the formula.

"Will you permit The World to ask your grace if you ever drink strong liquor?"

"I do not," quickly replied his grace, "and no liquor has been used at our table since December last. You are aware that it was the custom formerly to serve a little brandy, especially when visitors were present, but since the time I have just mentioned, be my guests, cardinals, bishops or others, there is now no strong liquor used at my table or elsewhere by my household. I have also ordered that the same rule be applied by the parish priests in my diocese, for, altho I have no right to go into the houses of the faithful and command them to abstain at the table, yet I have the right to do with my clergy, and I exercise this right."
