SACKVILLE, N. B., Nov. — 1906.
Sir—We had a largely attended meeting of the Sackville Hockey Club last night, and the club declared itself strongly in favor of having a purely amateur hockey team in Sackville this winter, regardless of the action of other clubs in importing or playing professional or semi-professional players, and at the same time decided to write to the various hockey teams in the province to ascertain their views on this subject and to find out how many and which teams are willing to pledge themselves to strict amateurism as we have done.
We are writing to Fredericton, Marysville, Moncton, Sussex, St. Stephen, Marathons, Beavers, Neptunes and Chatham.
We do not wish you to understand that we consider this movement, if it meets with general support, as we are sure it will, as involving the disintegration of the present New Brunswick Hockey League, but we do wish it understood that we are strongly in favor of the policy of having whatever hockey is played in New Brunswick this winter played by amateurs and by amateurs alone, and that we are prepared to take the initiative in any steps found necessary to attain this end.
What we would like to do is to have a meeting of your club as soon as possible and declare your stand in this matter, both by communicating the same to us and by publishing it fully in various newspapers, as we wish to obtain for this movement all possible publicity. We further invite public comments on the subject by all persons interested in hockey in this province.
