RUSSIA HOLDS THE KEY TO THE BALKAN SITUATION

Servia and Austria Ready to Agree Under Certain Conditions, and While the Matter is Still Unsettled Russia Has Power to Preserve Peace

BELGRADE, March 6.—The situation between Austria-Hungary and Servia, arising from the efforts of the latter country to secure compensation for the annexation by the Dual Monarchy of Bosnia and Herzegovina, was today acknowledged to be disquieting. POLICE STILL IN THE DARK IN THE KINRADE MURDER

Provincial Detectives and a Pinkerton Man Have Taken Up the Search for the Criminal.

HAMILTON, Ont., March 6.—The presence in the city yesterday afternoon of two provincial detectives, Miller and Greer, of the Ontario Criminal Investigation Department, and a Pinkerton man, gave rise to a report that the police were about to take some action in the Kinrade murder mystery and that developments would begin today. "Absolutely nothing," said Detective Inspector McMahon when a corps of newspapermen marched into the office this morning. "Miller" has not returned from Toronto, and in his absence the local authorities refuse to give out any information about what happened in the afternoon.

MONEY IN POTATO DIGGING ON THE PACIFIC COAST

Farmer Dug Up \$2,000 Evidently Buried by a Former Tenant of the Property.

SEASIDE, B.C., March 6.—A special from Portland states that Richard Cornett unearthed \$2,000 in gold dust and nuggets while he was spading in his potato patch near that city. The treasure, which was in a rusty tin box, is supposed to have been buried by an old Australian miner who died in a cabin on the property over 30 years ago. After the box had been found it was discovered that the place had been marked by 23 spikes driven in a log nearby. They were in a row pointing toward the treasure, which was just 22 feet away. The old miner had confided to his neighbors that he was rich but no one believed him. Now that the treasure has been uncovered, hundreds of the residents are searching for more.

WASHINGTON TO HAVE A WIRELESS SYSTEM

Thursday's Experience Tells the Capital to Rely No Longer on the Wires.

PHILADELPHIA, Mar. 6.—One result of the wire protestation due to the blizzard of Wednesday night will be the establishment by the city of a wireless plant on top of the city hall tower. The top of the tower is 537 feet from the ground and a powerful wireless outfit would put Philadelphia in touch with any municipality or sea station operating a wireless plant within a radius of a thousand miles.

WANT BETTER WEATHER FOR INAUGURATION DAY

Members of Congress Discuss Proposal to Have the Ceremony at a More Favorable Time.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—A constitutional amendment to provide for a change in the date of the inauguration of the president of the United States was the principal subject discussed by the few members here today. It was claimed that the difficulty involved in securing the ratification of such an amendment would not be so great as in a case where there was any controversy involved. It was even suggested that congress pass a resolution during the special session requiring the various state legislatures to ratify an amendment to the constitution which would provide a date for the inauguration on which the weather would likely be more pleasant than the 4th of March has been found to be.

SATISFACTORY FAILURE

LYNN, Mass., Mar. 6.—After a thorough examination of the books of Ludd and Currier, shoe manufacturers, who failed a short time ago, the assets of the firm are placed by expert accountants at \$288,070 and the liabilities at \$287,081. These figures do not include notes payable to the estate of B. W. Currier, amounting to \$95,000. The firm conducted a large shoe manufacturing wholesale and retail business with factories at Dover, N. H., and headquarters here. It also had a chain of retail stores in many large cities throughout the country.
