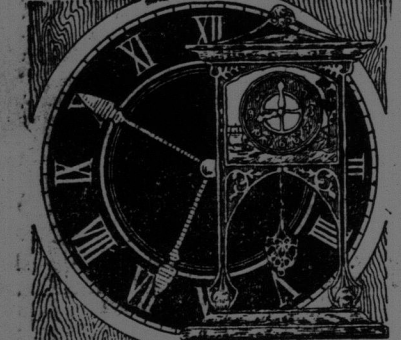

NO PROSPECT OF SALE OF ALLAN LINE

Says Andrew A. Allan, of Montreal, Who is in St. John Today—Rumors Regarding C.P.R. Control Incorrect

Andrew A. Allan of Montreal is in the city today. To the star he said that he was merely here on a visit to the local office of the Allan Line. This is his first visit in several years, and he had hoped to stay a few days, but will have to return to Montreal earlier than he expected.

Asked about the rumors regarding the purchase of the Allan Line by the C. P. R., Mr. Allan said that there was not a word of truth in the story and there was no prospect of any such transfer. Regarding the present ownership of the line he said that the shares were all held by his brother and two cousins, as could be seen by the public records in London, where all stock transfers have to be recorded.

HORSE AND RIG ROLLED OVER A STEEP HILL

Sudbury With His Team Went From North St. to Pond by a Quick Route—Little Damage Done.

A horse, wagon and driver rolled down the steep hill from North street to Pond street. The thrilling sight was witnessed about nine o'clock this morning.

A grey horse owned by Peter Dolan and driven by a man named Sudbury was proceeding toward York Point when the horse slipped on the ice near the Y. M. C. A. and with driver and wagon slid over the bank. The steep hill was a glare of ice. The horse fell and the driver fell between the shafts and the wagon. It was only an instant till the whole outfit slid down the hill and with a thump brought up again the rear of the Dominion Express Company's barn on Pond street.

Fortunately the driver escaped any injury, but the horse had its head cut and two of the wagon wheels were broken.

No. 2 chemical and No. 3 hook and ladder truck responded to a still alarm, but could do but little to get the horse out of its predicament. It was finally found necessary to sharpen the couplings on the horse's shoes, and when the animal was helped to its feet it was able to walk to Pond street apparently not much injured.

There is no protection on the top of the bank to prevent a team from slipping over.

SUIT AGAINST ADAM BELL
CONTINUED IN CIRCUIT

Moving Picture Operator Testifies That the Machine Was in Good Condition

The case of Miles Brothers vs. Adam H. Bell was resumed in circuit court this morning at half-past ten before Justice E. J. T. Barry and a jury. The reading of the evidence of the vice-president of the plaintiff company and a number of clerks taken under commission at New York on November 16th last was concluded shortly before noon.

Joseph Abrams, the moving picture operator employed by the defendant to go to Trinidad, was the first witness. He swore that the reels were rented to Bell by the company and that the machine was in good condition. Under cross-examination by Mr. Wallace witness described the mechanical workings of these machines.

Thomas X. Gibbon, constable, swore that in December, 1908, he made a formal demand for the reels from Bell but was met with a refusal.

The case is being continued this afternoon.

COMMITTEE MAY SAVE
TRIP TO MONTREAL

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy Will be in St. John This Month Returning From Great Britain.

The committee on the sale of the West St. John wharves to the C. P. R. will probably be saved at least one trip to Montreal in connection with the proposition. It has been announced that Sir Thomas Shaughnessy will sail for England on the eleventh of this month and is expected to land at St. John. Arrangements will probably be made for the committee to hold a conference with him while he is in the city. If his attitude is unfavorable that will end the matter, but if he shows a tendency to entertain the proposition the committee will have opportunities later for trips to Montreal.

At 10 o'clock No. 4 storm signal was ordered up, indicating a heavy westerly gale.
