
BUTTER-NUT THE COURTS. Review Case From Sussex Court To Be Heard By Judge McKeown This Morning.

New Governor Appointed--Imperial Bank Makes Offer to Loan Government Million and a Half Pounds at Five Per Cent.

Leheran, Nov. 30.—It is hoped that the step taken by the government in the appointment of Nizam es Sultaneh as governor of Fars will do much to produce a more satisfactory condition of affairs on some of the roads so largely employed by traders.

As has been mentioned on more than one occasion the state of the roads in the south of Persia has been most unsatisfactory. Nizam es Sultaneh, however, is said to possess a considerable portion of the main road between Bushire and Shiraz, in addition to which he has a considerable number of tribal followers in that part of the country, whom he will be able to employ in addition to regular troops for the purpose of maintaining law and order.

This is, evidently, the first step taken by the Persian government to restore a normal condition of affairs in accordance with the urgent notes on the subject that have been despatched to the government from time to time by Great Britain. The last and most emphatic note despatched recently by the British government was the cause of considerable comment.

It is understood that a definite offer to the Persian government of a 5 per cent. loan of £1,250,000, at the net price of 87 1/2. This involves the conversion of the existing consolidated debt. It is also understood that the bank, in addition to the above transaction, already advanced a sum of 100,000 toman, which sum it is believed will be in all probability tendered solely to the restoration of order in the unsettled districts in the south.

If there was an eternal destiny awaiting them dependent upon the consummation of this plan, what became of them? I must leave that for Christian theologians to answer.

The Redeemer came nineteen hundred years ago leaving the problem of the four thousand years for Christian theologians to settle. The sacrificial victim that was to consummate the plan came. From that time everything we would consider must go away during that period. KNOCKS FOR SUFFRAGETTES

Noted Prima Donna Who Appeared Here Year Ago Calls Move for Votes Utter Nonsense.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 30.—"It is not necessary for a woman in order to achieve success upon the operatic stage to figure in scandals and use profane language. Why she may even have a family and be opposed to woman suffrage," declared the celebrated prima donna, Mme. Schumann-Heink, who appeared in a song recital at Symphony Hall yesterday afternoon.

Mme. Schumann-Heink brought home point after point in her native German tongue, the reporter happening to have command of the same language himself.

She made it clear immediately that she was not what a prima donna is usually considered to be, but a domestic housewife. In a German household, although a native of Austria and although all important European centres have done homage to her remarkable talent Mme. Schumann-Heink considers America her home.

"I know that women suffragists resent my utterance," Mme. Schumann-Heink declared, "but I do not fear the opposition of my sex, or rather of a small portion thereof, when defending my principles.

"Say what you will, woman's sphere is the home, and anything that tends to draw her away from her duties at home is to be condemned on principle. This is the chief objection that I have against woman suffrage. Why, it's all nonsense, and here in America unpardonable nonsense.

"The care of the household and the training of the children take up all of the time of a dutiful wife and mother, and the latter is woman's chief calling. Will a woman who has not the brains to make her home cheerful have the necessary gray matter to intelligently participate in politics. Would not such participation be detrimental to the best interests of the family?"
