

LY'S BIG STRIKE PROVED DISASTROUS

Three Killed, Two Thousand in Jail and Financial Loss of Millions—Looking for Middle Course.

Milan, Italy, Aug. 13.—The "general strike" in Italy, which has now come to an end, has resulted in the death of three persons, the wounding of 16 and the arrest of 2,475, while the financial losses to workmen and employers amount to several million dollars.

At the present moment negotiations are proceeding with the purpose of finding an agreeable middle course between the claims of the transport workers and the terms offered by their employers.

SITUATION THE SAME ON 'FRISCO FAIR

Government's Stand as to Exhibiting at Panama Exposition Attacked in House of Commons.

London, Aug. 13.—Another assault on the position taken up by the British government in regard to the Panama-Pacific exposition was made in the House of Commons this afternoon, but failed to change the situation.

Colonel Geo. Gibbs, a Unionist, and John O'Connor, a Nationalist, both urged that the authorities of the San Francisco fair might be induced to change their rules in favor of the United Kingdom, being allowed to make a single collective national exhibit.

Francis Dyer, a Liberal, parliamentary under-secretary for foreign affairs, retorted, however, that this was only one of the reasons that made British participation inexpedient, and anyway, he said, the regulation as to scattered exhibits seemed to be a definite part of the exhibition rules.

Mr. O'Connor asked if this decision of a free trade government was a proper return to make to the United States for the reduction of its tariff.

"The American tariff has not been reduced," was the reply made by Mr. Acland.

West Land Regulations. THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must be a resident of the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency at the time of application, and must be made at the office of any Local Agent of Dominion Lands (not sub-agent) on certain conditions.

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NOVELIST'S AFFAIRS IN RECEIVER'S HANDS

Wife Claims \$1500 Arrears Alimony—Lequex Hadn't even Price to get to Meeting of Creditors.

London, Aug. 13.—William Lequex, the English novelist, apparently has reached an awkward situation as regards his finances, for his affairs were today in the hands of the official receiver on the petition of his wife, who claims \$1,500 arrears under the deed of separation.

Lequex in a letter to the official receiver expresses regret that he is unable to attend the meeting of creditors today, as he is in Belgium "without the necessary funds to go to London."
