

## PUBLIC OPINION IN GREECE MAY YET WIN OUT

## RESIGNS FROM THE OVERSEAS TOBACCO FUND

Arthur Private no longer handling Canadian end of it—F. R. Jones the new organizer.

Arthur Private, who has been organizer in Canada for the Overseas Tobacco Fund, has resigned that position and is returning to England. The new organizer in succession to Mr. Private is F. R. Jones. Through the columns of the Toronto World Mr. Jones makes an explanation of the objects of the fund and of Mr. Private's connection with it. As many New Brunswickers contributed to the fund and consequently are interested in it, The Standard republishes the following paragraphs from the World.

"Mr. Arthur Private was sent to Canada by the Overseas Club of London, Eng., to organize contributions from the Dominion to supply comforts in the form of tobacco for the Canadian troops at the front.

"The Overseas Club in sending him had every reason to believe he would accomplish a great work, and he has initiated many plans, including the placing of collecting lists in banks and the placing of lists and boxes in post offices throughout the Dominion, etc. "It should be understood that the Overseas Club in sending him on this mission did so from purely patriotic motives, and have themselves incurred heavy expenditure to carry out their ideal. The purpose of the club is to pledge its members as citizens of the greatest Empire in the world to maintain the heritage handed down by our fathers, believing the British Empire to stand for justice, freedom, order and good government.

"Five years ago the club had a small beginning. Today it has magnificent premises in Aldwych, London, in the very heart of the Empire's greatest city. It has upwards of 130,000 members, with His Majesty the King as patron, and H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught as vice-patron. Its long list of presidents and vice-presidents include names of Empire fame, and its central committee are some of the best known men in the city of London. The honorary secretary and organizer is Mr. J. Evelyn Wrench, and there are branches and corresponding secretaries in every town of any size in the Empire.

"The demand of the Toronto World for an account of the money collected for the Overseas Tobacco Fund, has led to the statement that all moneys are paid by contributors, collectors, post offices, etc., into the various banks in Canada, and by them remitted to their headquarters, who then hand the instructions to make no payments except to the head office of the club in London.

"Mr. Private has received no moneys which have not been at once paid into a bank, and he has always when moneys have been offered to him urged that the donor should himself make the payment into the nearest bank. "The Overseas Club would be glad to know of any single donation which has not been properly accounted for, and will offer facilities for anyone who has paid money for the purposes of the fund to satisfy themselves that the collector to whom it was paid duly handed it to a bank, and that the bank, in turn, remitted it to the head office of the club in London. Very careful investigations make it abundantly clear that there has been no leakage of the kind suggested.

## Here To Investigate

"When Mr. Private was sent to Canada in behalf of the Overseas Club Tobacco Fund, he was provided with money for his expenses, and from time to time such further credits as have been necessary have been forwarded. The club having reason to fear somewhat indiscreet and extravagant expenditure on Mr. Private's part made arrangements some weeks ago to secure the services of Mr. F. R. Jones, the honorary secretary and treasurer of the Sales Managers' Association of Great Britain, to visit Canada, take up the threads of the work initiated by Mr. Private and investigate carefully his expenditures.

"Looking into the financial side, Mr. Jones has discovered certain items of expense incurred without the authority of the club, and the responsibility of these will be borne by Mr. Private personally, and he accepts all responsibility.

## ULTIMATE VICTORY FOR THE SERBIANS IF SUFFICIENT HELP FROM ALLIES COMES SOON

Have Repulsed Enemy on Northern Frontier with Loss of 60,000 to Austro-German Army—Loss of Vranja is Denied—Battle Raging at Koprulj, on Nish-Saloniki Railway.

New York, Oct. 22.—A news agency despatch from Athens, via London, published here today, says:

"The Serbians have repulsed the Austro-Germans on the northern Serbian frontier, with enemy casualties of 60,000," announced a message from Nish to the Serbian legation here today. The message denied the Bulgarian occupation of Vranja, Veleosa and Knajavotof, but confirmed the fall of Istip and Kotsana.

The despatch was accompanied by a personal message from Premier Paeitoh, saying that if sufficient help from the Allies arrives soon, ultimate victory may be expected.

## LOSS OF VRANJA DENIED.

London, Oct. 22.—A despatch reaching London from Nish today says official announcement has been made at the Serbian capital that the losses of the Austro-German army of invasion have reached 60,000 dead, wounded and prisoners. The Serbians are said to have repulsed the invaders. The message was forwarded to the Exchange Telegraph Company from its Athens correspondent, who says this information was contained in an official telegram from Nish to the Serbian legation at the Greek capital. It is stated that among the Austrian and German prisoners are many officers.

The same despatch contains a denial that the Bulgarians have occupied Vranja, Veleosa or Knajavotof, but confirms the report that they have captured Istip and Kotsana.

## BATTLE RAGING ON NISH-SALONIKI RAILWAY.

Paris, Oct. 22.—An important battle between Serbians and Bulgarians is in progress at Koprulj, in Serbia, on the Nish-Saloniki railroad, about 30 miles south of Uspuk. A message from Athens to the Havas News Agency says information has been received from Saloniki that the Bulgarians are being assisted in this battle by Turkish cavalry. The Bulgarians, the despatch says, are fortifying the passes of Mount Rhodope. A great number of refugees from the north is arriving at Monastir, in Southwestern Serbia.

Amsterdam, Oct. 22, via London.—A representative of the Lokal Anzeiger at the Serbian front telegraphs that the desperate resistance of the Serbians is responsible for unusually small number of prisoners taken by the Austrians and Germans.

Serbian troops rarely surrender, even in hand-to-hand encounters, the correspondent says. "They fight until the last possible moment. Thus there are enacted in these battles horrible scenes of the wildest fighting unparalleled on any other front."

In connection with this we produce an exact copy of a cablegram received by Mr. George R. Lighthall, notary of 303 Quebec Bank Building, Montreal, from Mr. Evelyn Wrench, the secretary of the club, and which bears date Sept. 10, 1915.

The cablegram reads as follows: "Total money eight thousand, seven hundred and twenty-three pounds received from Canada for tobacco fund from October to end August. One hundred and fifty-two thousand parcels despatched in same period, each parcel value twenty-five cents. Total contents seven million, six hundred thousand cigarettes and thirty-eight thousand pounds tobacco. Canadian cash in hand, eleven hundred and twenty-three pounds. Please appreciate that two months and more must necessarily elapse before subscribers can receive post cards from the front. Delays arise through customs formalities, military authorities and war exigencies generally. Everything possible being done expedite deliveries but abnormal times abnormal delays. Post cards should be delivered Canada free."

"From this it will be seen that the total sum subscribed, £5723 sterling, represents 174,460 packets, at the rate of twenty packets to the pound sterling, or four to the dollar, each packet representing twenty-five cents. Of these, 152,000 packets have been forwarded to the front, leaving a balance of 22,460 to be forwarded. The cash in hand, £1123 is multiplied by twenty covers the exact number, 22,460, and it will thus be seen that a complete balance sheet is presented so far as moneys remitted to London are concerned.

"Of course there are other moneys in transit and which are being paid into the bank each day, and it should be borne in mind, as pointed out by the cablegram, that a period of something like two months must elapse before the packets subscribed for can reach the front and an acknowledgment be received by the donors in Canada; and further, it is impossible to ensure that every recipient of a packet will take the trouble to fill up the post card addressed to the donor which is enclosed in each packet sent."

## USED EIFFEL TOWER FOR EXPERIMENT IN WIRELESS TELEPHONY

Paris, Oct. 22.—The experiments which resulted in the successful transmission this week of the human voice by wireless telephone between Arlington, Virginia, and the Eiffel Tower here were begun last June at the request of the naval bureau at Washington.

Lieut. Commander W. R. Sayles, naval attaché at the American embassy to France, conducted the experiments on this side of the ocean, and he was assisted by H. E. Shreve of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company who brought the apparatus from the United States. Although the Eiffel Tower is constantly in use for military telegraphing, the French government readily agreed to suspend all communication both from the Eiffel Tower and from

## LABOR SCARCE THIS WINTER

Lumbermen experiencing great difficulty in finding men to go into the camps

## Special To The Standard.

Ottawa, Oct. 22.—Hon. W. T. Crothers, Minister of Labor, thinks that labor will be scarce this winter. Large employers of labor, chiefly lumbermen, are looking for men and cannot get them. They are hoping for relief when the western harvesters drift into Winnipeg. In that connection an appeal has been made to the government to assist in bringing these men east. However it is very unlikely that this will be done. Mr. Crothers has been asked to assist in getting one thousand men for a great power and pulp plant which is being established on the N. T. R. about 400 miles east of Cochrane, and is doing what he can to get them. This work will go on for two years.

Local lumbermen, and some in New Brunswick, are appealing for men. One New Brunswick lumberman wants 500 men. He states that he cannot induce local workers to go to the camps. This situation, however, is not a Minister of Labor to lay down the law to the lumbermen.

He announces to them with emphasis that the old system of making the men board themselves and keeping a store handy in which the men must make their purchases must cease. It has too often been found that these men at the end of a month find themselves owing the company owing them money. Exorbitant prices are in many cases charged for supplies. "Now," says Mr. Crothers, "the lumbermen must board the men and pay them something at the end of the month."

Another lumberman who said his charge for boarding the men would be \$25 per month, the Minister of Labor said: "That is altogether too much. It won't do."

Another large employer of labor has asked the government to release some of the aliens who are prisoners in the internment camps. Mr. Crothers replies to this that it must be shown him that this employer or any other has done everything possible to obtain help on a reasonable basis of pay and has failed, before he will even consider the question. At the present moment," concluded the Minister, "it looks as if there would be no lack of employment this winter. Indeed it seems as if labor in some industries would be very scarce."

## GREECE REFUSES CYPRUS, BUT ALLIED VICTORY IN BALKANS WOULD HAVE GREAT INFLUENCE

London, Oct. 22, (6.55 p. m.)—The Greek government has informed the quadruple entente powers that it does not see its way clear, at present, to accept the proposals, including cessation of Cyprus and other concessions offered in return for Greek military co-operation with Serbia.

While Greece's refusal to the offers is definite, so far as the present is concerned, it is felt by London commentators that a material strengthening of the entente allied contingent at Saloniki would have a very material influence upon the attitude, even of the Greek government. It is also believed by observers here that Greece cannot persist in her present ambiguous position, and that public opinion, which is generally understood to favor the entente allies will probably exercise its influence.

num), or with fibre from sifted soil. Next, fill the pots with soil to within three-quarters of an inch from the upper rim; then plant the bulbs so that their tops are covered with the soil. Water and place in a cool, dark section of the cellar, and protect from vermin. When the stems begin to lengthen, bring the potted or boxed bulbs up into the early winter sunlight and warmth. In about six or seven weeks they will have bloomed, and by Easter your garden or home will be radiant with a glory of variegated color that will enchant the eye and cheer the heart. Plant your bulbs now.

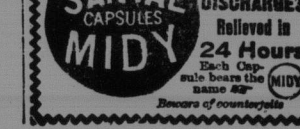
