To the Editor of The Standard:  
Sir,—It is rather unfortunate that an impression is abroad, that the stock to be offered to the citizens, in connection with the New Hotel project, is different in character, than that offered or to be offered certain individual or collective interests, who are expected to subscribe for a very large block.

IN RUSSIA  
FRENCH CLAIMS

France's Parliamentary Group Will Demand of Allies Priority Consideration.

Paris, July 12.—France's newly formed parliamentary group, organized to protect French interests in Russia, will demand immediate action for allied recognition of France's primary claims to the tangible assets of the Soviet Government.

The storm will likely break on the floor of the Chamber of Deputies which demands to be addressed by Premier Milland immediately on his return from Spa.

This group, headed by Deputy Erlich, expects to safeguard the interests of hundreds of thrifty French families, especially the small farmer-tradesman, who invested in Russia securities at the invitation of the French Minister of Finance, to assure old age and assist the allies.

French investments in Russia total \$2,250,000,000 at normal exchange rates, of which \$1,500,000,000 was lent directly to the Imperial Russian government, or companies and corporations whose obligations the government guaranteed.

French subscriptions to the Russian war loans totalled \$15,000,000.

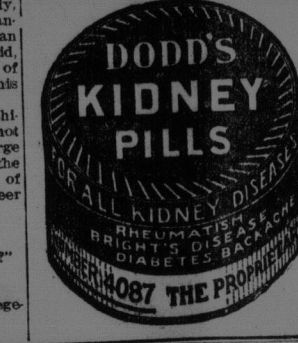
