Winnipeg Wheat Market Under Selling Pressure

Prices Broke About One Cent Higher on Close — Little Change in Coarse Grains.

Winnipeg, Oct. 29.—There was a wave of selling pressure during the last few minutes of today's local wheat market and prices which had been about 1/2 cent higher most of the morning, broke about one cent. The trade was unable to find any special cause for the sudden pressure. The close was half to 1/2 cent lower than Friday's close. The cash wheat market continues dull. There still was a fair demand for Number 2 Northern by shippers to fill contracts, and half sent premium over the deliverable difference was paid. Other grades were not wanted.

There was very little change in coarse grains. Futures were somewhat firmer, but the volume of business was not large. The cash demand continued poor. Futures closed 1/2 to 1/4 cent lower on oats.
