GERMAN FAILURE AT LOOS, "GAVE AWAY AND COSTLY REVERSE;" SERBIANS FIGHTING GALLANTLY IN DEFENCE OF THEIR HOMES

ALLIES MAKE FURTHER PROGRESS; ENEMY LEFT 8,000 DEAD BEFORE LOOS

Paris, Oct. 11.—Progress for the allied forces in Artois and Champagne is recorded in the French official communication issued tonight...

"We have made very perceptible progress in the wood to the west of the road from Souchez to Angres, in the Souchez Valley, and to the east of the Givency wood blockhouse."

"Our cannon have efficaciously counter attacked the German artillery which is shelling violently our new positions."

"Further information confirms previous reports that the violent counter attacks delivered by the Germans during the past few days against the British and French fronts in front of Loos and to the north of this point, have resulted only in a grave and costly check."

GERMANS TELL MOSTLY OF AIR FIGHTING

Berlin, Oct. 11, via London, 4:37 p.m.—The official account of operations in the western war zone follows:

"In the region of Souchez and Neuville and in the Champagne, northeast of Les Mesnil, enemy attacks with hand grenades were repulsed."

"Our battle airmen yesterday destroyed four enemy aeroplanes, one British aeroplane fell at a point east of Poperinghe, Northwest of Lille, Liez, Immelemin compelled a British battle plane, which was flying at a height of 4,000 meters to descend."

"Yesterday eleven fights in the air took place, in nine of which our air men were successful. One hostile aeroplane was driven to the ground inside the enemy's lines and was almost certainly destroyed."

BRITISH LOSE DIVISION IN EIGHTEEN DAYS

Total of Casualty Lists Published Since Oct. 1 Reaches 21,000. SIXTH M. P. GIVES LIFE FOR COUNTRY

London, Oct. 11.—British casualties reported since October 1 amount to more than 21,000. The week-end casualty list published today gives 200 officers and 4,300 men.

TORONTO BULGARS LOYAL TO BRITAIN

Toronto, Oct. 11.—At a largely attended meeting of Bulgarians and Macedonians here this afternoon a resolution was passed condemning the home government for throwing in their lot with the Teutonic allies, expressing loyalty to the government of Canada and the conviction that the highest interests of the Balkan States depended on the crushing of Germany, Austria and Turkey.

BELGRADE SUFFERS FATE OF WAR CITIES

Old Serbian Capital Three-quarters Destroyed By Austro-German Bombardment Before Capture. SERBIANS FOUGHT GAMELY WITH BAYONETS FOR TWO DAYS AND NIGHTS BUT WITHDRAWN TO PREVENT FURTHER DESTRUCTION—ONE REPORT SAYS 150,000 TEUTONS ARE IN SERBIA AND DOUBT IS EXPRESSED AS TO WISDOM OF SENDING LARGE ALLIED FORCE TO BALKANS—DEMAND FOR ROMANIAN INTERFERENCE.

Paris, Oct. 11.—Three-quarters of the city of Belgrade has been destroyed by 6,000 Austro-German shells and the fighting continues, according to an Athens despatch to the Matin.

"The newspaper Roumanie declares Roumania should intervene in the new theatre of war and that she cannot keep her sword sheathed without risk of compromising her interests and honor."
