Joint Stock Casualty.

The casualties that are coming to

light in connection with the manage-

ment of joint stock companies are doing

money into such concerns. Boards of

Directors often act as though the stock-

holders have no rights which they are

bound to respect. With some stock of

their own, a goodly number of proxies,

and several allies and confiding friends,

they manage to keep themselves in power

and prevent a searching inquiry into

their management. So long, in

fact, as satisfactory dividends are de-

clared and paid, no inquiry is ever

made. There may be as much waste in

committees to Directors on contracts,

salaries to useless officials, etc., as is

paid in dividends, for all the stock-

holders know. And when dividends fail,

and the Directors are changed, and

stockholders make an investigation, it is

rarely possible to get at the exact sys-

tem of robbery or mismanagement that

has been going on, as the possibilities

of account cookery are vast and varied.

Directors, in many cases, act as though

they own the property they manage,

and do not appear to have the slightest

idea that they are trustees in charge of

the property of other people. Although

the chief illustrations of this theme are

found in the States, yet New Brunswick

is not entirely free. Our readers will

remember at least two instances of

joint-stock corruption that have been

exposed in these columns, and there

may be others waiting for the light.

The exposures we have made, however,

are enough to make people cautious,

and we shall not be deterred by any

few of libel suits, any regard for

private feelings or friendships, or any

business or political considerations, from

exposing any new swindle of this kind

that may be foisted out.

The latest remedy that has been pro-

posed for joint-stock plundering is the

appointment of committees of stock-

holders for the purpose of making

rough investigations at irregular periods

into the management of affairs by Di-

rectors. This, it is expected, would

prove a wholesome check on managers

who now deem themselves practically

irresponsible.

Congressional Corruption.

Railway and steamship companies in

the States rarely bribe Congressmen,

when they want subsidies and other

favours. They are too foolish, as to do

this, and Congressmen are not so corrupt

as to sell their votes! And yet Congress

grants strangely liberal favours to such

companies, and Congressmen spend

money with great lavishness and get

richer faster than other men in receipt

of the same salary. Congressmen, instead

of being vulgarly bribed to vote for a

subsidy, are persuaded to buy a large

amount of the stock of the concern seek-

ing aid, or are induced to give a large

amount of the stock has been allotted to

them at a certain figure and may be

guardians of the public purse, vote the

subsidy, the stock they have bought
