V. No wild Swan, Goose, or Duck of the kinds known as the Mallard, Grey Duck, Black Duck, Wood Duck, or any of the kinds of Ducks known as Teal, shall be hunted between the fifteenth of April and the first of August in any year.

VI. No Wild Turkey, Grouse, Partridge, or Pheasant, Quali, or Woodcock, shall be trapped or taken by means of traps, nests, springs or other means of taking such birds other than by shooting, at any time whatever, nor shall any trap, net or snare be made, erected or set, either wholly or in part for the purpose of such trapping or taking.

VII. No person shall have in possemion any of the animals or birds hereinbefore—entioned, within the periods above prohibited, without lawful excuse, the peof whereof to be on the party charged.

VIII. Any offence against any provision of this Act shall be punished, on conviction before a Justice of the Peace, by a fine not exceeding five pounds nor less than five shillings in the discretion of such Justice, with costs, or in default of payment, by imprinonment for a term not exceeding one month; one half of such fine to go to the Municipality, and half to informer.
