OTTAWA PULL WIN
IN LAST APPEARANCE
ON FRENCHMEN'S ICE

1-0 Result Was a Surprise, and Gives Irish Chance.

HAMS SCORE IRISH

St. Pats Looked Bad in Tilt With Tallenders, But Pulled Up in Time.

MONTREAL, March 6.—Upsetting all the odds, the Ottawa Senators defeated the Canadiens 1 to 0 at the Mount Royal arena Saturday night in the last scheduled game of the N. H. L. season here.

The game was one of the hardest-fought here this season, with the winning and only score being made after sixteen minutes of play in the last period. The count came as a result of a combination play on the part of Nighbor and Denneny, the latter netting the puck after taking a pass from Nighbor from back of Canadiens' net. It was not a good exhibition of hockey, the close checking and sticky condition of the ice precluding any chance for brilliant play.

Throughout the three periods the two teams fought with little advantage for either, the Ottawas having a little edge on the game, but being gradually worn down by their heavier opponents. The visitors played a desperate game from the start, showing more energy than in their two previous appearances here, but were still far from being the snappy team they were in the first half of the season. The local team did not display the speed and snap that has characterized their play in the last eight games, and at no time in Saturday's game did they seem to be getting. From the start the Ottawa team adopted a strictly defensive game and maintained it throughout the period.

There were sixteen minor and one major penalties imposed during the game.

WITH REGULAR LINE
HIMES WILL PLAY

Fryer Clipped Fast Centre
Over Head, After Gong Rang.

LAY CASE BEFORE O. H. A.

Collingwood Fans Threw
Rocks and Stones At Galt
Players in Dressing
Room.

GALT, March 6.—When Galt's hockey champions arrived home from Collingwood shortly after 5 o'clock Saturday morning on their special train, about 300 citizens were on hand, despite the early hour, to welcome the boys, every one of them a home brew, who had put Galt on the hockey map and gave it its first O. H. A. championship. Headed by the jazz band, which accompanied the team and 300 rooters and Mayor S. E. Charlton, the team was paraded uptown. Galt is hockey crazy, and Mayor Charlton has proclaimed a half holiday Tuesday, and a great crowd will go to Toronto by special train to see their idols compete against the Soo in the Allan cup elimination series. The team will go to Toronto Monday to have a workout on the artificial ice, and will be taken over to the St. Pat's hockey game.

Play Struggle Ice.

The victory of the Galt team has been truly a remarkable one, they having played all but one of their games after getting out of the group an strange ice at Preston, the visitors thus being on even terms with them. In the last three series of games there was one game on hard ice and one on soft. Out of 20 games, this season the Galt champions have won 17, lost 2 and tied 1, and they have scored 131 goals to their opponents' 88. The team is still the reigning force in the senior Northern League championship, and if they should win that would set up a record hard to beat.

The champions were somewhat handicapped, when "Punch" George, the regular left wing man, was injured in the final game of the group of the final game of the group of the final game. He has been unable to play since, his absence weakening the Preston team. Then Alex. Watt, who was laid out last Wednesday night at Preston when Fryer checked him, the Galt man being carried off the ice unconscious with a nasty scalp wound. He suffered slight concussion and was unable to go to Collingwood. The climax came, however, in Collingwood, Friday night, when Fryer committed one of the most cowardly acts ever witnessed, hitting Norman Himes, Galt's star little centre man and one of the cleanest players in the game, over the head with his stick after the gong announced the final play. The attack was no doubt due to the fact that the Collingwood veteran had been checked to a standstill all night. The offending player hurriedly disappeared from the ice, with Galt fans in pursuit, but the Collingwood doctor was locked and a policeman put on guard. However, it will not be surprising if the Galt management puts the full facts before the O. H. A., leaving it to that body to give the veteran his just dues. The light Galt team was body-checked last night, but they were the superiors of the shipbuilders and at no time were they in danger. After the game Collingwood fans hurled bricks and stones through the windows of the Galt dressing room. While the Galt team played its semi-final game all within one hour, the boys are out to give their best Tuesday night, and the team will line up as usual. Norman Himes is able to play. So great is the enthusiasm over Galt's first hockey victory that the project to give the city an arena which is so badly needed has been given fresh impetus, and definite action is expected to be taken shortly.

Fishermen Want a
Schooner Race, Not
a Yacht Tea Party

Controversy Over Forthcoming
Race Loud in Fo'c'sles
of Both Fleets.

BOSTON, March 5.—Whether a fishing schooner should be built for speed threatens to cause an international marine controversy. The for'c'sles of the fishing fleets of this port, Gloucester and Provincetown have been the scenes of stormy sessions this winter, stormier often than the wintry seas and skies without, due to discussions of the International Fishing Schooner Championship and the craft that are building mentioned for the title race of Gloucester, N. S., next fall. Keen rivalry exists among these ports as to which will gain the honor of defending again in Canada the trophy that the Gloucesterman, Esperanto, won from the Nova Scotian, Delawana, last November.

The down east fishermen of Nova Scotia are no whit less keen on the question and in virtually every boat sailing out of Boston or Gloucester are the representatives of the Maritime Provinces who divide the partnership of their present ports with those home ports from which they first went to sea. The result has been discussions that run from comment in the press to controversy in the plot house, largely over the issue of how far a fishing schooner may be refitted for speed.

The Canadians, defeated by Esperanto, set to work at once to build a boat that could win next fall and when she began to take form on the ways at Lunenburg, N. S., those who saw her and the plans for her sailed christened her the "Big Ark." Esperanto was admittedly unequal to a test with such a boat and Gloucestermen looked on the issue of how far a fishing schooner may be refitted for speed.

CANUCK VETS DEFEATED.

NEW YORK, March 6.—The Canadian veterans' hockey team was defeated by the St. Nicholas Club of New York 10 goals to 3, in a three-period contest last night. Russell Ellis, the St. Nicholas centre, led in the attack with 5 goals. McDonald, Adams and Sweeney scored for the Canadians.

As a result the Mayflower, now on the builder's stocks at Essex with a dozen or more still showing on the side of her oak keel, was conceived. W. Starling Burgess, naval architect was commissioned to design her and resembled the America's Cup defence yacht, Resolute. The men of Gloucester are reported to be critical of consideration of such a boat as a fishing schooner, but those of Canada have taken objection formally and informally to several features and threaten to bar the Mayflower from the competition.

Designer Burgess admitted the Mayflower was drawn to lines as nearly those of a yacht as it was practical to design a fishing schooner, but he and those most active in the project insist she will be in every sense a deep-sea fishing vessel, fulfilling every stipulation in the International Fishing Schooner Championship requirements, including which says that she must participate in the fisheries for one season before she is eligible to race.

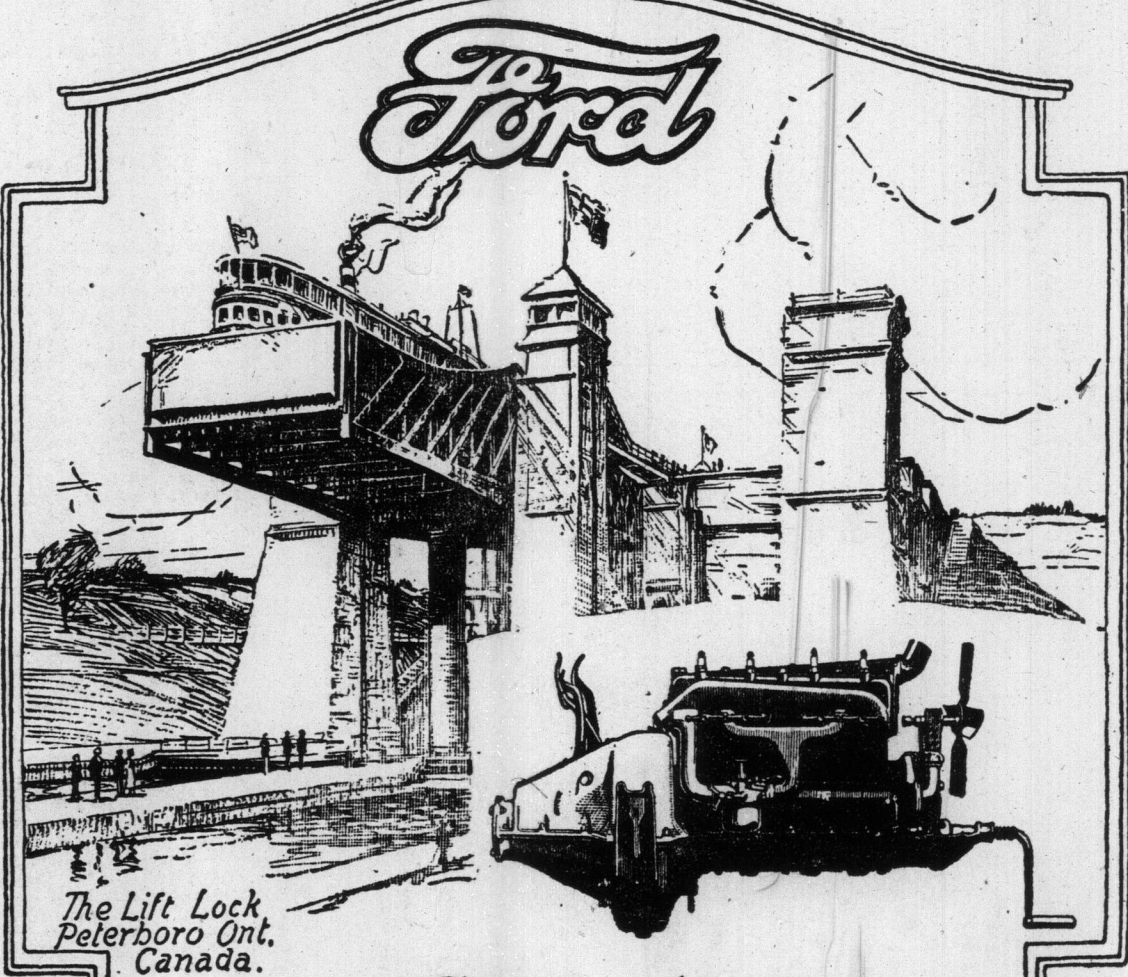
The Canadians have set April 30 as the last date in which a vessel could start the fisheries and be considered to have met the seasonal stipulation. Accordingly, Mayflower is being rushed with the idea of launching her about April 15 and getting her away by the end of the month. The shipbuilders are working overtime without extra wages, have volunteered to do the job, and St. Esau to work sixteen to eighteen hours to have the canvas ready for her when she takes the water.

Dimensions of each boat have been known and have been the subject of the discussions and controversy that have been waged, but the Canadians have been lacking up to now and those given below offer the first opportunity for direct comparison of the Canadian challenger and the Boston boat Mayflower. TO SPEND \$12,000,000.

TORONTO, March 5.—The annual estimates of the Toronto civic works department issued by Work Commissioner Harris today, provide for a total expenditure of \$12,055,824. Of this \$8,550,552 is for capital expenditure. The estimates do not include the cost of constructing the duplicate waterworks system, which, it is roughly estimated, would involve an expenditure of \$35,000,000.



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
