DISTRICT AND GENERAL

Stook threshing of wheat is quite general in Ontario this fall.

Plans for holding a world's fair in Vancouver in 1927 are under consideration.

Mr. Johnston, of Sarnia, has bought out the hardware business of Parker & Company, at Alvinston.

The Inspector General of Banks to be appointed next month, a new post, will receive \$25,000 a year.

Near Wallaceburg two motorists were badly hurt when their car ran over a cow lying on the road and was ditched.

Robbers entered the general store of J. Courcy, Tilbury, Thursday night and secured \$75 in cash from the cash register.

Wm. Braun was sent to jail at Atlantic City for 60 days for annoying his neighbors by playing a mandolin after having been ordered to stop.

Richard Code, a well-known resident of Lambton county, died at Alvinston on Saturday, aged 82 years. He leaves one daughter and five sons.

The printers' strikes in the United States and Canada during the past four years cost \$15,000,000, and of this some \$2,000,000 have gone to the Toronto strikers.

Nine cattle under a tree near Owen Sound were killed by lightning. Other similar accidents show that a single large tree is not the safest shelter in a thunderstorm.

All advertising signs along the highway in Lancaster County, Neb., will be torn down, according to the county road engineers. Only highway markers will be permitted.

Three thousand citizens of Detroit work each day on the Canadian side of the river, while four thousand cross the river every morning from the Canadian side to Detroit.

After managing the Revere hotel at Alvinston for nearly twenty years Fred Benner is closing the place up as a non-paying proposition and will open a boarding house in Windsor.

At Toronto Exhibition a little chap dashed under the guard rope of one of the exhibits and was beginning to eat a large, red, juicy-looking apple. Then suddenly his face changed from joy to gloom and he began to cry. "It's wood!" he wailed.

London Township farmers have destroyed over 100 dogs in the past fortnight in a community effort to get rid of an unknown pack of sheep killers that have through their depredations done fully \$5,000 damage to valuable registered stock this year.

Gordon Koepke, a resident of Southampton, set a trap on his premises at night with a view to catching a mink suspected of making nightly raids on his chickens. In the morning he was surprised to discover a large wild cat caught fast in the trap.

Freddie Jackson, ten years old, of Watford, was frightfully stung by bees when a herd of cattle which was being driven through the town stampeded and overturned several hives. The bees caught in his clothing and his whole body was covered with stings.

All over the province an increased interest is being taken in the preparing of land for fall wheat. More fields than usual at this date are being worked, and the prospects are that the acreage sown this year will be larger than that of any of the last three years.

Kent county police have received a complaint from John Tait, of Raleigh township, to the effect that a sheep on his pasture farm, Bothwell, was slaughtered, dressed and left hanging in a tree in the woods. The thieves apparently planned to return at night to secure the meat.

During old home week at Watford thieves made a raid on several of the stores. About \$75 worth of tea and some \$50 in money were taken from the store of P. J. Dadds, and B. F. Cooke, druggist, lost two cases of whiskey, valued at about \$100, together with about \$60 in money.

A change in the system of collecting income tax will soon take place. Under the new systems, the collection of income tax will be handed over to the Customs. The Dominion will be divided into districts, and the collectors of customs at the different parts will be in charge. Extra clerks will no doubt be required to do the work.

After travelling almost 4,000 miles from his home in Point Texas, Will A. Harris, an educator, arrived in New York in his home-made house-car last week. With him were his wife and his daughter, 8 years old. The family has been living in the machine since last December. The grey painted house that Mr. Harris built on a motor truck chassis is 18 feet long, 7 feet wide and 6 feet 3 inches high. It contains two rooms, separated by a curtain, in which are two beds, a table, stove, closet and washroom.

GLENCOE COUNCIL

A special meeting of the town council was held on Friday evening, at which the engineer's report on the Siddall-Wright drain was adopted.

On Monday evening the council again met and provisionally passed the necessary by-law for the proposed drainage work and fixed the date for the court of revision on the assessment of the drain for Monday evening, September 22. No other business was transacted at either meeting.

The next regular meeting of the council will be held on Tuesday evening, September 2nd, on account of Labor Day falling on the regular meeting date.

AGED APPIN RESIDENT DIES

Appin, Aug. 27.—The death occurred in Appin on Saturday afternoon, August 23rd, of Mrs. Donald McTaggart, in her 83rd year.

Mrs. McTaggart was one of a family of twelve children of the late Neil McLean, one of the first pioneers of Ekfrid, of whom only two sons survive, Archie, of Bothwell, and Gilbert, on the old homestead, near Melbourne. Over forty years ago she married Mr. McTaggart and came as a bride to the farm adjoining the village of Appin, living continuously there until the burning of their home six years ago, after which they moved into the village, where they have since resided.

The funeral service, held on Monday afternoon at the Baptist church, was largely attended. Interment was made in Mayfair cemetery.

Sympathy of the community is extended to Mr. McTaggart in his bereavement.

EKFRID GIRLS SELECTED

Marion Campbell, Anna McCallum and Margaret McCallum, of Ekfrid, are the three young ladies who will represent Middlesex county in the inter-township judging household science competition at the Canadian National Exhibition on September 2.

R. A. Finn, chief of the department of agriculture, states: "The girls named above were the successful contestants in the preliminary judging held in London on Friday under the supervision of Miss Margaret Brown, coach."

This is the first year that competitors in this nature have been held for girls, and the team from this county is conceded to have good chances to win laurels.

ROUND TABLE CONFERENCE

J. G. Lethbridge, M.L.A., left on Tuesday for Toronto to attend the Round Table Conference being held at the Parliament buildings Exhibition week.

The conference is to discuss and get data on different problems confronting the country at the present time. Representatives will be present from the Bankers' Association, Boards of Trade, Manufacturers' Association, Retail Merchants' Association, Railway and Express Companies, Trades and Labor Council, Builders and Supplies Association, United Farmers of Ontario, Union Stock Yards, abattoirs, drovers, commission houses, etc.

SPECIAL EVENTS AT FAIRS

One of the outstanding features of the rural school fairs this year will be the number of special events planned by the department of agriculture. In Middlesex County it is practically assured that all fairs will have at least one or two competitions in agriculture work.

R. A. Finn, chief of the department here, said Saturday that they were being aided in this work by the various women's institutes.

Already lists of specials have been mailed to Appin, Dorchester and Parkhill, while the remaining schools will receive the same during the week. Many agricultural associations are contributing prizes, the principal one to date being that of the Ontario Sheep Breeders' Association. They are giving away a considerable amount of money at the Appin School Fair for sheep raising by the school children.

From present indications agricultural officials are of the opinion that the fall fairs for 1924 will be the largest and most successful ever held in Middlesex county.
