THOS. WILKINSON IS THE NOMINEE

**Supporters of the Borden Platform Nominate Aid.
Thos. Wilkinson As Their Candidate--All United
to Send a Supporter of R. L. Borden to Ottawa.**

The Conservative convention called to meet here today consisted of a large number of delegates and representatives from the different parts of the riding. Besides the Regina delegates there were good delegations from Rouleau, Yellow Grass, Milestone, Balgonie, Arat, Pilot Butte, Hedgesford, Condie, Tregarya, Fox-leigh, Earl Grey, Graven, Babuana, Aylesbury, Craik, Lumsden, Wascana, Findlater, Dundonald, Pense, Grand Coulee, Springdale and other parts of the constituency.

President Whitmore took the chair and called the meeting to order. A committee on credentials was appointed and commenced work at once.

The resignation of J. K. McInnis was read and on motion received and accepted.

Nominations were accepted before adjournment at noon and were as follows:

J. K. McInnis, nominated by J. S. D., seconded by H. C. Rankine.
Thos. Wilkinson, nominated by J. A. Goth and seconded by J. Brooks.
Dr. Cowan, nominated by A. J. Bradley and seconded by S. J. Taylor.
B. J. Bott, nominated by J. H. Anderson and seconded by D. D. Ryan.

These were all the names that were placed before the convention.

The candidates were called on in the order in which they were nominated. J. K. McInnis, B. J. Bott and Dr. Cowan withdrew after making short but appropriate speeches, pledging their hearty support to the candidate. The unanimous nomination was consequently tendered to Mr. Wilkinson who replied briefly.

Addresses were delivered on questions affecting the campaign by F. C. Tate, M.L.A., T. A. Anderson, M.L.A., and G. S. Houston.

The greatest unanimity prevailed throughout the convention and every element of the party and supporters of the Borden platform are united and determined that the Regina constituency shall elect a Borden candidate on October 26th.

THE CANDIDATE

Thomas Wilkinson, was born in Cheshire, England, in September, 1867, moved to Canada in 1871, and has spent more than a quarter of a century on the western prairies. In 1894 he married the third daughter of Judge Holman, of Grand Rapids, Minnesota, and engaged in farming near Birtle from 1895 to 1900, and

the next ten years were spent in the general store business and banking business at the latter town, and also as general travelling agent for the McCormick Harvesting Co. Moved to Pense, Sask., in 1900 and successfully carried on a hardware and lumber business for four years, was instrumental in having Pense erected into a village and was elected the first Overseer. Having a thorough knowledge of the west Mr. Wilkinson at once saw that Regina was destined to become the chief social and commercial centre of the great new province, about to be created, and moved here in the fall of 1904, to take charge of the Cockshutt Plow

Co.'s Saskatchewan business, and was the means of establishing a provincial general agency. With unbounded confidence in the west, and Regina as a distributing centre, he set to work with the spirit of western enterprise and built a warehouse. In 1905 he built the one he occupied when manager of the Fairchild Co., one of the largest concerns in their line of business in Canada; in 1906 he erected the Downey street warehouses. In 1907 Mr. Wilkinson was elected Alderman for Ward 4, City of Regina.

Mr. Wilkinson is an energetic man with a clean record and his election would be a decided acquisition to the Borden cause. He is a good organizer and an untiring campaigner.

BORDEN ON H. BAY ROAD
Government Ought to Build, Own and Operate Terminals and Elevators--Conservative Policy for Years.

Belleville, Ont., Sept. 26.—Asked for his views as to the prime minister's statement at Niagara Falls respecting the Hudson Bay railway, Mr. Borden said this morning: "Sir Wilfrid Laurier has suddenly discovered the eye of a general election, that the Hudson Bay railway must be built. The Liberal Conservative party has been pledged to the building of that railway ever since 1895, when it was promised by Sir Charles Tupper. The present government has reached the same conclusion in the thirteenth year of their administration. Sir Wilfrid Laurier declares that the government will build the railway, or, rather, some party of men will be entrusted with its building.

"In my opinion the road should be built by the government immediately and under such conditions as will ensure absolute control of the rates to be paid by the farmers of the west. Sir Wilfrid Laurier says the terminals and all the elevators shall be built by the government and retained by the government. My opinion is not only built by the government, but operated by the government as well, in order to prevent unfavorable conditions which in the past have proved extremely disadvantageous to the great producing population of western Canada."

The Bank of British North America will erect a building at Battleford.

THANKSGIVING DAY SET
November 9th is the Date-- Election Officials to Get More Pay--Better Salaries for Civil Servants.

Ottawa, Sept. 26.—A meeting of the cabinet council, attended by the four ministers now in Ottawa, Hon. Messrs. Aylesworth, Lemieux, Fisher and Scott, was held this afternoon and all arrears of departmental business requiring consideration in council were cleared up. An order-in-council was passed proclaiming as Thanksgiving Day, Monday, November 9th, which is also the King's birthday.

A new civil service classification and a scale of prices for lighthouse keepers were adopted. The schedule will have the effect of slightly raising the salaries now in force, and will generally better the conditions of the men who have hitherto been paid comparatively inadequate salaries.

Permission was given for the passage through Canada of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery company of Boston, bearing arms, on October 4 next, en route from Boston to Chicago.

Several amendments were made to the existing schedule of salaries and allowances to returning officers, constables and other officials connected with the carrying out of the provisions of the election act. The secretary of state, Hon. W. R. Scott, has found that owing to the small amount now authorized for the payment of individual election officials there have been many refusals to accept the positions offered. Accordingly the pay of election constables has been raised from \$1 to \$1.50 per day
