M. 9 July 1849 at St Benoit, Two Mountains Co., Angelique Delorme dit Lemay. Is a manufacturer, Justice of the Peace, a Major, V.I., and Mayor of the Municipality of St. Placide. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e.—A Conservative.—Vankleek Hill, Ont.

RYAN, MICHAEL PATRICK, J.P. (Montreal Centre.)

Third s. of William and Mary Ryan. B. at Pallis Donohill, County Tipperary, Ireland. Ed. there. The family came to Can. in 1840. Settled on a farm near Chambly. Kept the Franklin House from 1849 to 1855. M. Margaret, eldest dau. of Patrick Brennan, Esq., merchant. Was elected a member of the Corporation of Montreal in 1852. Sat for three years. In 1856 went into the provision business, and for many years did the largest business in the trade. Retired from it in 1875, owing to severe losses sustained Was a mem. of the Council of the Board of Trade, Montreal. Three times elected President of the Commercial Exchange Assn. Captain of Militia. Was Director of the M.O. & O.R. First elected to Parlt. by acclamation for Montreal West in April 1868, on death of Hon.
