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presented to the public than any other aspect of our war effort. This uneasiness has been reflected in more thoughtful papers like the *Ottawa Journal*, *Toronto Saturday Night*, the *Winnipeg Free Press*, etc.

A careful review of what has been done, and why, with emphasis on the underlying purpose of preserving freedom would serve to allay much of this uneasiness — which exists mainly among liberally minded people, not unfriendly and often genuinely friendly, to the Government.

The moral effect in the United States would be considerable. The most effective of the isolationist arguments against war there is that it would destroy freedom at home. A practical demonstration of the concern shown by our Prime Minister to preserve freedom in wartime would do much, I feel, to offset this argument.
