Special to The Planet. Toronto, April 24.—1.40 p. m.—The cross-examination of Frank Sullivan was commenced by E. F. B. Johnston, when the Gamey-Stratton investigation was renewed this morning. Sullivan denied emphatically that he ever received any money from Gamey or

tion was renewed this morning. Stilling denied emphatically that he ever received any money from Gamey or, that he ever got any money from the Government other than the \$2 a day he was drawing as departmental clerk. The story that a parcel of money was delivered to Gamey or witness in the smoking room of the Parliament Buildings from Mr. Stratton, Sullivan also denied, also the story about dividing the money. He also denied that there was any written document between them about Gamey receiving \$5,000 for his support, consequently he never tore up such document as Gamey said. Sullivan gave some details of the interview between Gamey and Stratton and said that when the latter said the word "consideration," it simply meant that Gamey would receive the same consideration as other members of the Government. "That is a lie." same consideration as other members of the Government. "That is a lie." said Sullivan emphatically when confronted with Gamey's statement that they had divided \$3,000 in Ontario Bank bills. Upon the subject of the Crossia piano factory episode Sullivan said that while he did not know van said that while he did how any any one was concealed there he noticed a wet umbrella on a chair and that made him suspicious. Stratton, he said, knew nothing of any deals between himself and Gamey. Frank Ford, the solicitor of the frank Ford, the solicitor of the treasury department, admitted type-writing the X. Y. Z. letter and enclosure to Gamey in which the latter was told how to deal with this Manitoulin constituents. He did this at the request of Sullivan. He also type-worte the Globe interview and the the request of Sullivan. He also type-wrote the Globe interview and the letter Gamdy signed in which the latter agreed to support the Ross Government. Stratton had asked him to do this.

ARRESTED AT BUFFALO.

James T. Nelson's Charges Against Liberals.

Buffalo, April 24.-Following his arrest for stealing an affidavit that he was being urged to sign, James T. Nelson has made a statement, in which he charges the Liberals with using money unlawfully in the elections of January last in North Perth, North Norfolk and North Grey. Nel-North Norfolk and North Grey. Nelson several weeks ago made a sworn statement to A. W. Wright, Conservative organizer for Ontario, in which he says he was employed to get ten men from Buffalo to go to the three named places and distribute the funds. He claims he sent the men, that they did their work, and that his dealings were mostly with Capt. John Sullivan. The names of the men are in the possession of Mr. Wright, and he says his information implicates men of prominence in Ontario, among them lawyers, doctors and newspaper proprietors.

A. W. Wright came to Buffalo on A. W. Wright came to Buffalo on Monday, in response to a telegram from Nelson, in which the latter said he was being approached for another affidavit denying the one he had made to Mr. Wright, John J. McCarty, a Buffalo saloon-keeper, Nelson says, offered him \$75 for a second affidavit. "McCarty told me he had it all ready for me to sign," said Nelson; "so yesterday afternoon my attorney and I went to McCarty's lawyer's office. I put the document in my pocket and the lawyer locked the door. I told him would throw him through it, and then he let us out. On the street he had me arrested for stealing the unsign daffidavit."

The fracas occurred in the office of Attorney John T. Ryan, in the Erie County Bank building. Nelson was arraigned this morning in the Police Court, but his case was postponed until to-morrow.


