## A WARM GAME

Among the fiercest things in the way of a lacrosse game ever seen around Detroit, was pulled off at the D. A. C. (Thursday) afternoon in the shape of a contest between the Detroit and Wallaceburg teams. The game was never finished on account of a squabble over the decisions of Referee Lally, of Cornwall, Ont., who was hissed by the crowd of 400 for his very bad work.

When the game terminated the score stood a tie at two each, but only 10 men against 12. Burns and Brown failing to report in time. The locals were further handicapped, as Referee Lally ruled McDonald, the star of the Detroit team, out of the game so often that he could scarcely be said to have taken part. In all, 90 minutes of play were consumed.

McDonald participated in only eight minutes of the game. Alleged roughness was the cause for the many banishments of Detroit's star, but if McDonald was rough in his tactics, it would be difficult to describe the style of play adopted by the Canadians. The local players asserted that on four distinct occasions the visitors used tactics that no referee, however biased, could fail to see, but only once did the official's ban fall on the offender.

Detroit outplayed the men from Wallaceburg at all stages of the game and had no trouble whatever holding down their opponents, but they had hard work running up a score themselves without the aid of McDonald, who usually figured prominently in almost every play. Sewell had his head cut open during the game but continued to play. He suffered a bad scalp wound. He scored one of Detroit's goals, the other being credited to King. Appledorf and Dulong made the goals for Wallaceburg.
