

SYDNEY, N.S.—The town engineer will report upon the cost of installing water meters for all services.

MEAFORD, ONT.—Plans for harbor improvements here have been submitted to the Board of Trade for inspection.

DIGBY, N.S.—The council will extend the waterworks system towards Green Point, at a cost of \$2,000.

PRESTON, ONT.—The Canadian Office & School Furniture Company purpose erecting new buildings.

HALIFAX, N.S.—It is reported that the Canadian Bank of Commerce will erect a new building in this city.

EAST TORONTO, ONT.—Mr. Snell intends building a block of stores on the corner of Gerrard and Main streets.

COLCHESTER, ONT.—A. Baird, C.E., is preparing plans for extensive improvements to the Long Marsh drain.

RENFREW, ONT.—Thomas Logan purposes enlarging his woollen mills.—Mr. Williams will build a hosiery factory here, the Council assisting by means of a loan.

HAMPTON, N. B.—The G. & G. Flewelling Company have definitely decided to rebuild their saw mill and box factory, the foundations having been commenced.

PETERBORO, ONT.—It is the intention of the Canadian General Electric Company to spend about half a million dollars this year for new buildings and plant.

NORTH BAY, ONT.—J. J. Warren, of Toronto, representing the pulp company, has purchased a site on which to build the mill, and work will be proceeded with immediately.

WINDSOR, ONT.—The Building Committee of the Board of Education has recommended that steam heating apparatus be installed in all schools, at estimated cost of \$10,000.

NELSON, B. C.—The Kootenay River Lumber Company, organized by Joseph Genelle and John Billings, will build a new mill and install a complete sash and door equipment.

GLACE BAY, N.S.—The Dominion Coal Company will erect a number of dwellings for employees.—The erection of an infectious diseases hospital will likely be undertaken at an early date.

STRATFORD, ONT.—The Stratford Hotel Company, Limited, has been organized, with a capital of \$50,000. It is proposed to build a fine hotel. G. G. McPherson is a large stock-holder.

YARMOUTH, N. S.—The town council has decided to take immediate steps to install a street lighting system and will shortly call for tenders for electrical apparatus, engines and boilers.

SMITH'S FALLS, ONT.—G. T. Martin, architect, this town, has completed plans for Presbyterian stone church at Balderson's Corners.—It has been decided to enlarge the town hall and secure plans for a new fire hall.

CLINTON, ONT.—The Dominion Government is asking for tenders up to 21st inst. for construction of hot water heating system in post-office in this town. Plans on application to Henry Stevens, Clerk of Works, and at the Department at Ottawa.

ST. JOHN, N. B.—J. & L. B. Mayer purpose making additions to the Coldbrook excelsior mill and erecting a foundry.—The City Council has decided to build a new ferry boat. A prize of \$75 will be given for the best design.

INGERSOLL, ONT.—H. C. McBride, architect, of London, is preparing plans for erection of a new church for the North street Methodist congregation.—The proposed library building will be erected on the market site. Plans for a suitable building have been asked for.

OSHAWA, ONT.—The Council will construct a granolithic sidewalk on west side of Simcoe street and north side of Mill street, at estimated cost of \$1,240.—Nearly \$6,000 has been subscribed towards erection of proposed hospital.

VANCOUVER, B. C.—The council of North Vancouver has requested competitive plans for enlargement of wharf and landing. Particulars from Alex.

Philip, Ions of Court.—The congregation of Mount Pleasant church will take steps to provide increased accommodation.

SAULT STE MARIE, ONT.—Dr. Adams purposes erecting a building near the Bank of Commerce.—It has been decided to submit a by-law to the ratepayers to raise \$30,000 for erection of new High School and \$16,000 to build a new town hall and a fire hall.

SARNIA, ONT.—R. W. Fawcett, architect, is preparing plans for a red brick residence for J. R. Geddes, 2½ storeys, cost \$5,000.—The Government will be petitioned to dredge the harbor here and at Point Edward to a depth of 20 feet.

VICTORIA, B. C.—F. M. Rattenbury, architect, is about to erect a two-storey brick building on the site of the old Vancouver Hotel.—It has been definitely decided that a new tourist hotel will be built at Oak Bay, to replace the Mount Baker.

CHEMAINUS, B. C.—The Victoria Lumber & Manufacturing Company intend building a railway from Ladysmith into the timber limits owned by the company. In connection therewith a wharf 400 feet long will be built in Oyster Harbor.

CALGARY, N. W. T.—An architect has been instructed to prepare plans for a stone Methodist church to cost about \$20,000, with steam heating, art glass dome, balcony, etc.—The Great West Saddlery Company will build a factory and warehouse 75x130 feet, cost \$30,000.

BARRIE, ONT.—The County Council will call the attention of the Government to the necessity of building a bridge over the Severn river between the townships of Orillia and Morrison.—Thomas Kennedy, architect, has prepared plans for remodeling the interiors of the Queen's and Wellington hotels in this town.
