THE NEWSPAPER LAW.

1 Any person who takes a paper regularly from the post office, whether directed to his name or another's or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the payment. 2 If a person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrears and the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made and then collect the whole amount, whether the paper is taken out of the office or not.



EDITORIAL NOTES.

Toronto's mammoth industry, the Massey-Harris Manufacturing Co., are about removing their immense works to the American side of the Niagara, where they contend they will have the advantages of unlimited power at a cheap rate and a wider market for their goods.

Six million feet of logs have been rafted into Collingwood for the purpose of being cut up. This timber, which is sufficient to keep the large mills in that town running until next fall, would all have gone to Saginaw or Bay City but for the abolition of the American import duty on lumber. Our neighbors by abolishing that tax, have done an exceedingly good turn for Canadian lumber men and mill hands.

If Grand President Mallory is correctly reported, his remarks at the Patrons' picnic at Kingston last week indicates that the Patrons in Assembly will form a distinct party in their action. He is reported as stating that if the day ever came when the Patron party became the tool of Mowat or Meredith in the Local House, or of either party at Ottawa, that day would see a Mallory leave the Patron party. He has called the 17 Patron members to meet at Toronto in a few weeks.

The cheese trade is getting an interesting study since refrigerating facilities have come to admit of the storage of a large portion of summer goods that formerly were obliged to go forward to the English market at once and at all hazard. It is stated that the quantity of cheese in cold storage in Montreal to-day is so large that all the available space has already been taken up, and holders have actually been obliged to ship their goods from the city to the Morrisburg Cold Storage Company and pay the extra freight, because they could not get room there for another box. Such a condition of things has never before existed in the history of the cheese trade.

The Globe issues the following solid platform, thoroughly endorsed by us: Freedom of trade. Non-partisan redistribution of the constituencies. Manhood suffrage, one man one vote and one voters' list. Abolish Government House. Abolish the Senate. Abolish Rideau Hall appropriations. Abolish the Deputy-Speakership of the Commons. Reduce the number of Ministers and Government departments. Reform the superannuation system. Reform the law courts, limit the facilities for appeals, simplify and cheapen litigation. Abolish taxation exemptions. Establish a railway commission and prevent discrimination between Canadian shippers and against Canadian ports. Reform the militia system. Abolish "extras."

Stop the milking of contracts and railway subsidies for campaign contributions. Canada first.

This was done to give place to the county convention with the Provincial Association. Mr. J. C. Gilchrist moved an amendment which was seconded by Mr. Dun. McDougall, teacher, of Lindsay, that the convention be not abolished but be continued annually as formerly. The amendment was carried almost unanimously.

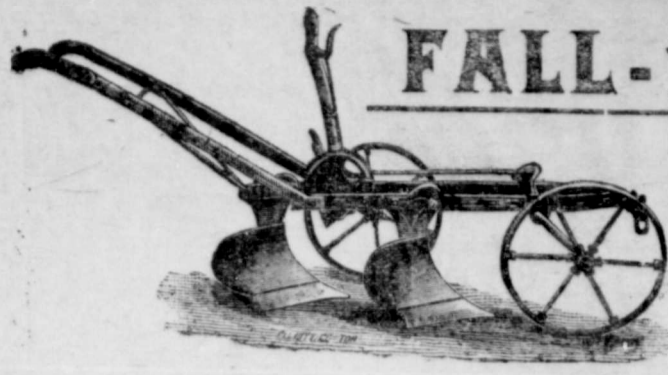

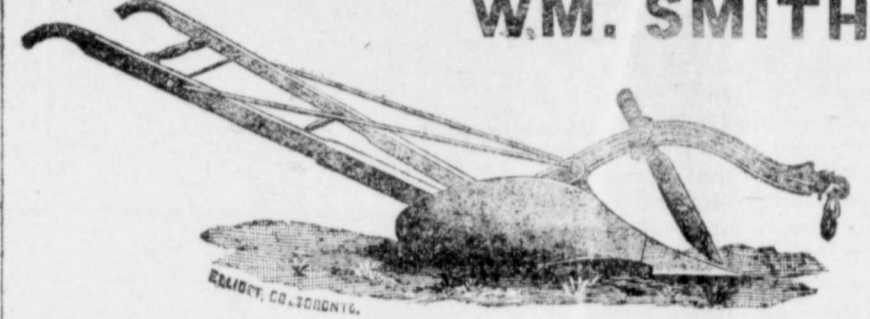

THE DISTRICT.

Alliston gives its band \$100 a year. Orillia council has appointed a night watchman at \$10 per month.

The Collingwood Bulletin says that fruit in that section will not be more than half a crop.

The length of the steamer Orillia will likely be increased by 40 feet during the coming winter. The estimated cost is \$9000.

We notice a Bracebridge firm offering a farm of 100 acres (6 cleared), with house, barn and stables, for \$100; and another farm of 100 acres, (15 cleared), with about 200 cords of tanbark, birch and other timber for \$350.

Roach's Point farmers say that the crops are turning out splendid, particularly alsike, which has produced between seven and eight bushels to the acre. Rain is needed badly for the root crop.

From the beginning of the year up to the present month Britain took timber and lumber from Canada to the value of six and a half million dollars, while in the same period last year she took only four million three hundred and sixty thousand dollars' worth.

On Georgina Island there is an Indian woman who entered her hundred and first year last February. She was eighteen years old when the war of 1812 opened. She is quite active, and walks a considerable distance to church.

Cremona's rate of taxation for the current year is 25 mills; Stayner's 22; Collingwood's 21.

A call to Rev. John Burton, a Congregational minister in Toronto, from the Gravenhurst Presbyterians will be considered at the next meeting of the Barrie Presbytery.
