Nor would we consult the feeling of a generous People, or discharge our duty in a manner becoming their Representatives, were we to pass in silence the personal exposure and the incessant and humane exertions of Your Excellency to mitigate and check the horrors of the pestilence: Conduct, such as this, has secured to You the unfeigned gratitude of all classes of the People of every part of the Province.

The prompt humanity exhibited by His Majesty's Government in forwarding a liberal sum for the relief of destitute Emigrants, who have no claim upon this Community, is worthy of the Nation

which extends her succour to distress throughout the world.

We thank your Excellency for directing the Public Accounts to be laid before us, and for causing them to be continued to the end of the year, for our better information: We will carefully examine them, and the Estimate for the ensuing year, and cheerfully grant the necessary Supplies for the support of the Government.

Of Your Excellency's zealous exertions to advance our Commercial interests and uphold the civil and religious rights of our Constituents, we are already assured. We shall cordially co-operate

with Your Excellency in the promotion of such objects.

We accept with pleasure Your Excellency's declaration of Your anxiety to be useful to the Province; and we trust that the loyalty and harmony which have hitherto distinguished this Assembly, may lead to the adoption of such measures, during the present Session, as may be satisfactory to Your Excellency; to His Majesty's Government, and to the People whom we represent.
