Upon examination of the timber in the bridge, they were found to be in a fair state of preservation, and may stand for considerable time yet. The economy of keeping up a bridge covering so large a surface of the street, however, is questionable. Were the stream walled in to about one-half of its present channel and the surrounding ground raised with earth and gravel, the demand for new plank and timbers which as it now stands is a necessity every little while, would be greatly lessened, and although the outlay might be greater at first, in the end it would be more sure to prove the least expensive.

Sale of Lots.

According to announcement the sale of building lots on the premises of D. D. Hay, M. P., came off on Tuesday last. The attendance of purchasers was not very large, and comparatively few of the lots changed ownership. The sales effected were chiefly in the vicinity of the prospective park. The prices ranged from \$10 to \$150. The locality is undoubtedly one of the very best in town for private residences, but its distance from the commercial centre was felt to militate against immediate sales. However, now that an opening has been made, a growing demand is likely to follow, and no distant day a large number of fine buildings in that vicinity.

Excursion to St. Dovers.

The first excursion of the season over the P. & D. H. R. to Port Dovers took place on Tuesday last. There were very few left Listowel to attend, and the excursion was not so successful as had been anticipated. A considerable augmentation was made as the train proceeded, and by the time the lake was reached a respectable excursion party had been collected. As there are many in this vicinity who have never seen Lake Erie, but who wish to visit it to take advantage of a cheap trip in order to do so were they only made aware of an opportunity, the Company would find it a profitable investment to advertise their excursions in such a way that the public may know when they take place.

June Cattle Fair.

The usual monthly cattle fair was held here last Friday. The usual rain storm was on hand also, and played its part in making the fair almost a "successful failure." All told there were not over 50 head of cattle on the ground, and owing to the absence of buyers the greater part of those remained in the hands of their owners. Several milk cows, a few fat calves and a number of inferior young animals comprised the lot. With the exception of an old local sale, and the purchase of a few head by Mr. P. Robb of Maryborough, we heard of no transactions taking place. There was a considerable display of agricultural implements in town during the day, which seemed to attract much more attention than the meagre show of cattle.

London Conference.

Rev. J. G. Scott has been absent from town attending the London Conference which has been in session at St. Thomas during parts of last and the present week. The members of the Canada Conference, who met in Listowel, were greatly pleased at the certainty of retaining him as their pastor for another year at least. In connection with the conference, a ladies' meeting was held in Grace church, at which Rev. Mr. Scott was the first speaker introduced. The Free Press gives the following brief outline of his excellent address on that occasion: "Many influences were at work to develop physical, moral and spiritual humanity. The former would take care of itself; the latter needed careful training. He took strong ground that the Bible should occupy a more prominent position in the schools, not only from the fact many children never go to church on Sunday-school, and thus, if they learn not from the Bible in the public schools, they are unlikely to have its precious truths taught to them during childhood. He spoke of the amount of impure and atheistic literature printed, stating that the sum of these classes amounted, together, to 43 million of volumes. The conversion of the children was very important, but it was not done when that was accomplished. They must be properly trained. We had numbers of church members who were good, but good for nothing, because they had never been properly trained. The social element must also be largely used in order to succeed. Jesus was not despised, as could be learned from the fact that little children delighted to be with him. While the mother did her part, the father must do his. He protested against the father being absent a night in the week, and be only a boarder in his own home. Let the children also be brought to the church. The idea that the services of the church and Sunday School are too great a strain upon the child is absurd. We are work-

They find that it requires less labor and returns more profits than butter making, although the prices offered for cheese this season are certainly not the most encouraging.

Several new dairies with stone foundations have lately been erected in this neighborhood, and others are in course of preparation for being raised. Some fine brick residences have been built during the past year in this section. These are good evidences of progressive spirit.

Mr. Raviel, jr., of the 6th line, keeps quite an Apiary. He has already thirteen hives occupied by honey gatherers, which last year yielded him some 50 lbs. weight of honey, and he expects this season to increase his bee-village by several swarms. So far this season the bees have not been able to gather any more than they need for their own family purposes, but before they have accumulated a large quantity of this excellent luxury.—Cox.
