HAINS' WENT TO BAYSIDE TO INSPECT REAL ESTATE

FLUSHING, N. Y., Dec. 28.—The defense scored two material points in the evidence adduced in the trial of Thornton Hains. EDITH ATKINSON ATTACKED AND BRUTALLY TREATED BY A "HUGGER" ON WEST SIDE

"Jack the Hugger," who has been making a reputation for himself on the West Side during the past month or two, and whom the police believed to be a practical joker, has again made his appearance. That he is not a joker by any means was clearly demonstrated last night when many were startled to hear that Miss Edith Atkinson, of 339 Charlotte street, had been assaulted and brutally handled about 9.30 p. m. while returning to her home.

Miss Atkinson, who is about eighteen years of age, was walking quite rapidly up Charlotte street, and had just reached the corner of Charlotte and Lancaster when a man stepped out of the shadow of the Masonic Hall and took hold of her. Miss Atkinson screamed for help and the stranger placed his hand on her throat, saying at the same time, "If you speak, I'll kill you." Not willing to be so easily conquered, Miss Atkinson continued to struggle until she was thrown to the ground. She at once sprang to her feet, screaming for help as she did so, and was thrown to the ground the second time, striking on her face.

Her screams had by this time alarmed the neighborhood and seeing that assistance was at hand, the unknown man disappeared. When some of the neighbors who heard the girl's cries for help reached the scene of the assault they found Miss Atkinson lying on the ground, her face covered with blood and her hands badly scratched. She was dazed and unable to give any description of the "hugger" beyond the fact that he wore a hard hat and a long black overcoat.

Friends assisted Miss Atkinson to the residence of W. R. Scully, just across the street, and the police were telephoned. Officers Gosling and Hughes responded and closely questioned all those present among whom was Roy Harding of 31 Erin street,

THINK CHILDREN HAVE CONTRACTED DISEASE

Foot and Mouth Expert Will Investigate Cases in New York State

ALBANY, N. Y., Dec. 28.—An expert from the State Department of Agriculture has been sent to investigate the suspected cases of foot and mouth disease among children in the town of Clarkson, Monroe County, which have been reported to Commissioner Porter of the State Department of Health. Commissioner Pearson of the Agricultural Department, said today that a number of other suspected cases of the disease among humans have been investigated but in each instance the patient was found to be suffering from some other malady. At the state health department it was said that Commissioner Porter was not at his office and that no action had as yet been taken in the matter.

Beginning tomorrow the federal authorities will permit the shipment of live stock from any point in the state, except the counties of Erie, Niagara, Orleans, Tennessee and Monroe, to any other point in the state, over the quarantine against the foot and mouth disease, said Commissioner Pearson today, no live stock, hay or straw could be shipped over any line which went into another state.
