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



Prussian Gospel of Force Attacked, and Internal Position of Germany Laid Bare in a Prophecy of Peace

London, Jan. 2.— (New York Times cable)—A despatch to The Daily News from Dotterdam says:

The most significant of all the New Year articles in the German press is that of Vorwaerts, entitled "Peace Year—1917." It gives an amazingly frank picture of Germany; internal position, attacks the Prussian gospel of force, and declares the task for the future is to find the road from war socialism to peace socialism. Admitting that it requires courage to decgribe 1917 as the peace year, the paper says:

"Already mortally wounded, the beast of war roars aloud once more. His death agony will perhaps last for months and we shall have to carry on the struggle, but it must be in a double sense, a struggle in decrease against the enemy and a struggle for peace. There can be only one more short, final fight and the year 1917 will be the greatest year in the world's history, for it will again bring us peace."
