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WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over 16 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

Application must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within one mile of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions.

A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

Line stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

In certain districts a homesteader in poor standing may preempt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$10 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead grant, also 20 acres of land. Preemption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead is granted on certain conditions.

Settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre.

Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.
