42nd Black Watch Regt.  
Benares, India, Nov. 12th.

I have so far recovered from malarial fever as to be able to leave the hospital, where I have been confined since Nov. 1st. I left the hospital yesterday and came over to see the soldiers. The non-commissioned officers invited me to their quarters to stay a month, but I think I shall not stay very long.

The doctor has forbidden me to shed any for twelve days yet, so I shall leave my wheel here until I get stronger, and go by train to Allahabad, Lucknow, Cawnpore and Agra, then come back here and get my wheel and start again for Bombay.

I hope to arrive in Cape Town by February if I am not detained too long in Bombay. It will be difficult to get a passage to the Cape as the crews of boats running in these waters are all natives.

### OLDEST WAITRESS IN BOSTON

Boston, December 26.—It seems hardly credible to one of this generation, accustomed as we are to the crowded cafes, restaurants and dining rooms and their numerous trim and sprightly waitresses, to believe that the first girl to wait on a table in a public eating house in this city is living and is still a wage earner.

It nevertheless is a fact, and the name of the woman who has that honor is Miss Rose Carey.

Although she does not now wait upon table in the old building at the corner of Union street and Marshall lane, occupied by Atwood's oyster house, she is in the employ of the Atwood family, in their residence at Everett.

Miss Carey is an old woman now. She was born at Aylesford, N. S., March 6, 1828, but she is as active as a woman twenty years younger.

She came to Boston in April, 1837, and went to work in the family of Dr. J. J. Clark, who lived at 33 Stillman street, but the following year she was employed as a domestic in the home of Howes Atwood, then a resident of Cooper street, and has remained in the family ever since.

While the first stone of Cologne Cathedral was laid on Aug. 15, 1248, and the body of the edifice was not opened until Aug. 15, 1848, six hundred years later to the very day, it was not, however, until Aug. 15, 1880, that the splendid structure was finally reported completed, having thus occupied in building the record time of exactly 632 years.
